Museum Shows 50 Models of Allied, Axis War Aircraft

Fifty kinds of Allied and Axis army and navy planes in miniature, built to scale, now are on display at the Wisconsin historical museum, Charles E. Brown, director of the museum, announced Saturday.

The models of American, British, Russian, German, Japanese, and Italian fighters, bombers, and other war aircraft were made by Milwaukee high school students, working under the direction of Roy A. Radke, city supervisor of industrial arts.

The exhibit was brought to the museum by W. B. Senty, state director of the model aircraft project of the state department of public instruction.

All Famous Makes Shown. All of the famous makes of flying arsenals are shown and all are accompanied by diagrams illustrating the manner of their construction, Brown said.

The model planes were made with the cooperation of the U. S. office of education, Washington, D. C. Twelve thousand similar airplane models are to be constructed for the high schools of the state. This is the first public educational exhibit of the models.

Show War Posters. Along with the exhibit a new collection of U. S. aviation and other war posters is being shown. Miniature planes have been found valuable for use in training plane spotters to recognize the various kinds and the nations to which they belong.
