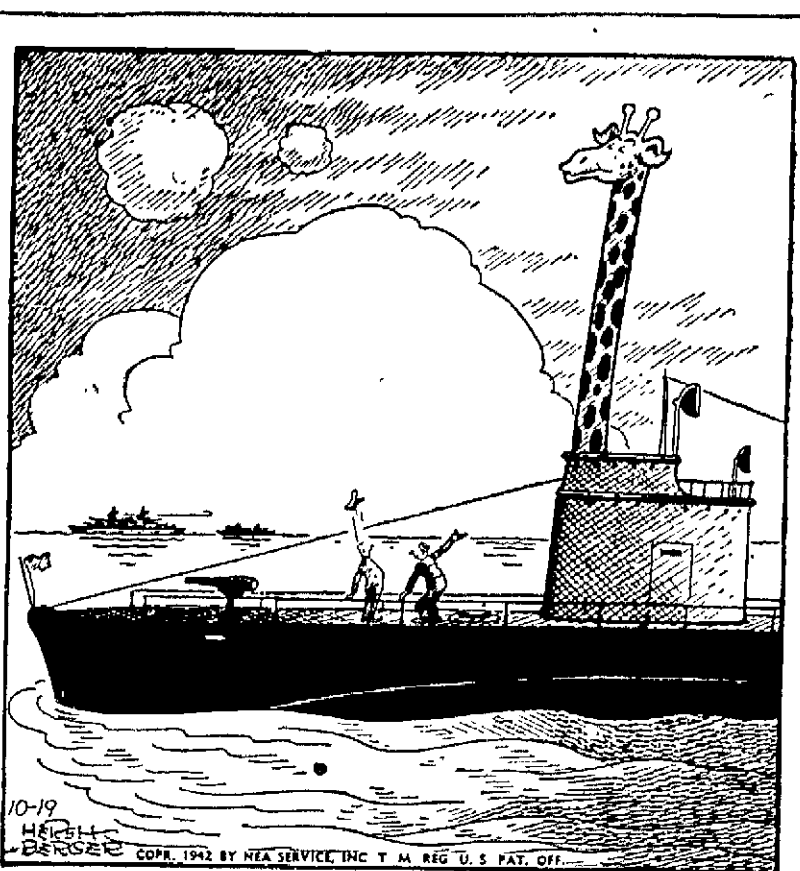

BUSES TO HAUL PLANT WORKERS

School Vehicles Will Be Used For War Employees In Rural Areas

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 19.—(AP)—Ohio school superintendents were told today that buses used to transport pupils in rural areas also would be utilized to haul war plant workers to and from their jobs.

William Y. Blake, an executive in the State Utilities Commission office, said that since Ohio has the second largest number of war workers in the nation—many of whom must travel long distances to jobs in the larger cities—normal transportation facilities would be unable to handle the increasingly heavy load.

"School buses must now be used outside of school hours for the transportation of war workers," Blake said.

"Statistics have shown that the average war worker travels 35 miles each day to and from work. If transportation is not provided for him, he would have to move nearer to his place of employment. Such mass migrations of war workers would result eventually in ghost towns and communities."

The county superintendents ended a two-day session of discussing the schools' role in wartime.
