LONDON- (U.P) - The German news agency DNB reported Monday that German submarines had encountered in the Atlantic and off the American coast a modern version of the "Q" boats which "The strength of the under-were famous in the first World

> The "Q" boats were heavily armed subchasers disguised as harmless merchant ships.

> DNB said that a U-boat was suddenly attacked in the Atlantic by a small "Q" ship's guns just as it prepared to fire to torpedo.

### Don't Send Food to Men Overseas, Army, Navy Ask

The war and navy departments have asked that no food be enclosed in parcels mailed to armed forces, overseas. Postmaster .W. J Hyland announced today.

Hyland also warned that pasteboard boxes are not strong enough containers for gifts sent overseas. Recent publicity referred to shoeboxes only as indicating the maximum size container desirable, but was not intended to encourage their actual use, he said.
