

Screen Version Of Stage Play Will Open At Quilna

"My Sister Eileen" Portrays Complicated Life Of Two Girls In Basement Apartment In New York

The complicated life of a couple of girls in a basement apartment in New York City, told first on the stage, is now offered in screen version in "My Sister Eileen," which will be offered Friday evening at the preview program of the Quilna theatre.

Opening Friday at the Lyric theatre is "Men of San Quentin," a story of life behind the prison bars, written by a reporter who covered many of the events of interest within the institution.

The current program at the Sigma theatre is "Sin Town," a western thriller. The current program includes "Gambling Daughters," starring Roger Pryor and Cecilia Parker, and "Escort Girls."

The new film at the Ohio theatre commencing Friday is "Gentleman Jim," starring Errol Flynn in the role of the heavyweight who gained this moniker. Others in the cast are Jack Carson, Alan Hale, Alexis Smith, John Leder, William Frawley, Medelaine LeBeau, Minor Watson and Ward Bond.

The current program at the Sigma theatre is "Sin Town," a western story of an oil town, with Constance Bennett and Patric Knowles in the leading roles. Anne Gwynne, Andy Devine and Leo Carrillo also appear in the cast.

Currently at the State theatre is "Cardboard Lover," starring Norma Shearer with the great lover, "Robert Taylor," who is reportedly about to fulfill his promise to another screen hero and join the Army.

prototype of the real warden, giving a most natural and convincing performance, ably seconded by Eleanor Stewart as his pretty young bride brought to live in one of the guards' cottages within the prison reservation.

The drama shows Hughes as a sergeant guard involved in a plot of a crooked deputy warden to frame him for the killing of a guard and a prisoner in a jailbreak. How the young guard fights free of the frame-up with the help of a trusty played superbly by Jeffrey Sayre, forms an exciting hour of screen entertainment as you will encounter for a long, long time.

There is a scene where Dick Curtis as the killer of a fellow convict goes near-mad in solitary confinement as he faces the ghost of the man he killed, that for sheer tension matches anything the motion pictures have given us in years. It's a honey!

While essentially a drama of pure entertainment, an unusual touch is added with the introduction of the famous San Quentin Radio Hour, showing the glee club and the band in their broadcast from the prison "studio," the same bring the mess hall, with a studio audience of several thousand prisoners enjoying the program.

The celebrated prison announcer, G. Ralph Durr, has built himself up into a fine job as an announcer on a San Francisco station when he leaves in a few weeks on parole. He is heard announcing the slogan of the San Quentin Men: "To do our bit in defense work in the fight for freedom."

Here is a very unusual motion picture crammed with exciting action and human sentiment that will appeal to men and women alike. Outstanding performances are contributed by Dick Curtis as a convict going mad in solitary confinement; Jeffrey Sayre as the trusty who kills the crooked deputy warden and then commits suicide; and Art Miles as the master brains who plans a jailbreak that meets with an unexpected ending.

Director William Beaudine turns in a strong and fast-paced thriller.

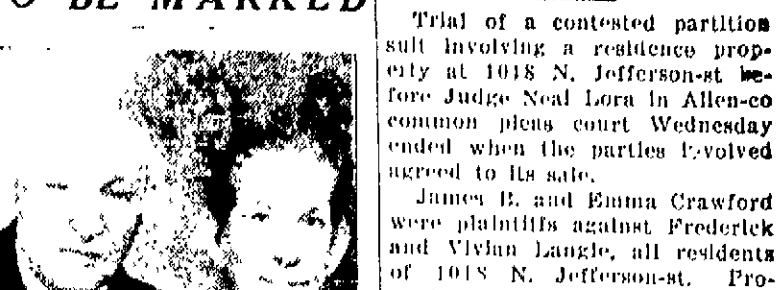
