"My Sister Eileen," is the screen version of the hit comedy which panicked the Broadwayers for two solid years. In screen form, the film is said to be even more uproarious, and Joslyn has something to do with that fact. In the film he appears as a theatrical reporter "on the make" for Eileen.

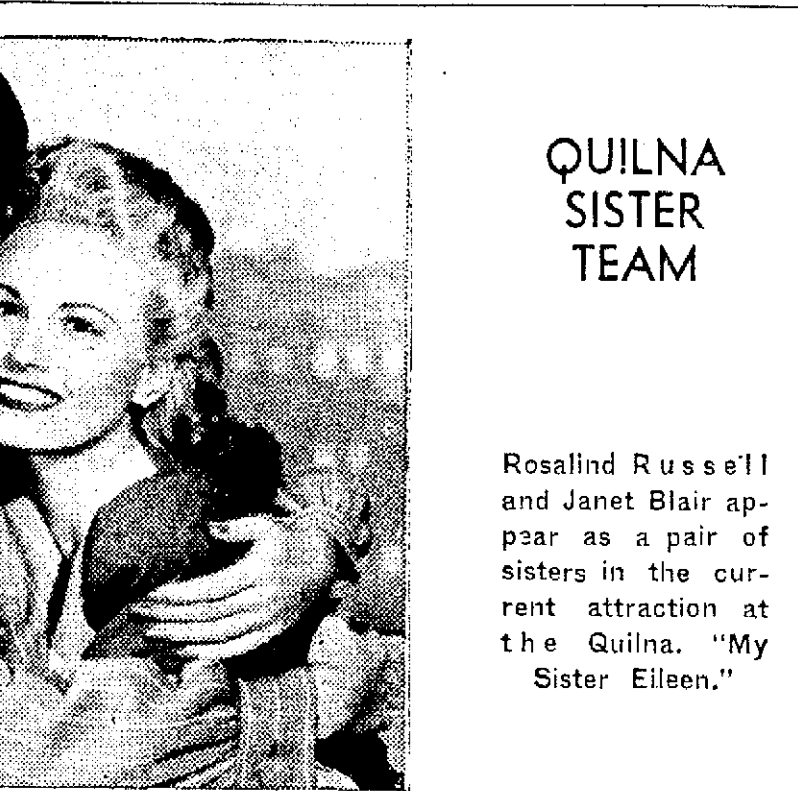

Dynamic Role Portrayed On Lyric Screen
