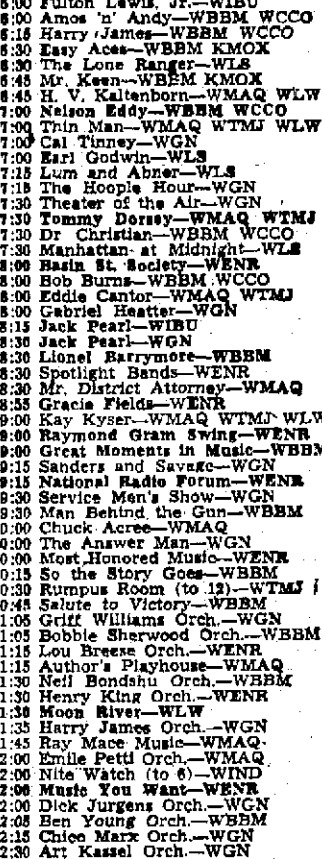

Court Closes for One Day; Flynn Works

HOLLYWOOD—(U.P.)—Errol Flynn received a one-day respite for movie heroics today between charges by a pair of 17-year-old beauties that he had intimate relations with them.

Monday Flynn listened to blonde Betty Hansen tell of his removing her clothes, all but her shoes, in a Bel Air boudoir. Today he makes movie love to Ann Sheridan. Wednesday he returns to court to hear Peggy Satterlee, a dark-eyed youngster, tell of being intimate with him aboard his yacht.

Flynn's preliminary hearing, at which most of the testimony to date has had to be expurgated for print, was interrupted for a day to give all participants except the accusers, who were too young, an opportunity to vote. The first session ended with Flynn's lawyer, Jerry Geisler, getting into the record his client's initial reaction to Miss Hansen's story:

'A Horrible Lie'

"It's all a horrible lie," Flynn said, according to his lawyer. Miss Hansen told how she'd slid into Flynn's lap from the arm of his chair after a dinner party last Sept. 27, and how she'd sipped a green-colored cocktail, which seemed to contain whisky. In any event, she said, it made her ill.

Flynn took her upstairs, she added, and undressed her, except for her shoes. She insisted during cross examination that she thought she was going to take a nap.

"But when you found you were not going to sleep," Geisler insisted, "didn't you try to push him away?"

Flynn Hears Story. Miss Hansen said she hadn't. Neither had she kicked him, she said, nor had she scratched him.

Police Lieut. R. W. Bolling, attached to the juvenile detail, told of taking Flynn to juvenile hall to confront Miss Hansen who told her story.

"What did Mr. Flynn say?" Geisler asked. "He denied his guilt," Bolling testified.

"Didn't he say, 'it's a horrible lie'?" Bolling couldn't remember, court adjourned, and Flynn returned to his pocket the pencil with which he had doodled furiously all day long on a pile of yellow scratch paper.

Kadens Calls Trial 'Waste' for Taxpayers

CHICAGO—(U.P.)—Irwin Kadens, who confessed a long list of crimes including rape and kidnaping, went to trial on a robbery charge today and termed the prosecution "a waste of the taxpayers' dough when they could give me the hot seat for kidnaping."

Kadens, who was described by Federal Bureau of Investigation as one of the nation's "most dangerous criminals," went to trial on a charge of attempting to hold up a currency exchange office.

The holdup attempt, frustrated by police, resulted in his capture Oct. 19 after he had engaged in a three-month series of crimes.

Defense Atty. Charles E. Bellow, told the court that Kadens is "mentally sick."

"I object, your honor," shouted Kadens. "I'm not nuts."

Bellows then asked for a continuance of one week.

"I object," shouted Kadens again. "What kind of a lawyer is this guy? I want to fire him. I want to be tried now."

Kadens' aged mother burst into hysteria and was led from the courtroom by bailiffs. His wife and two small daughters watched quietly as the process of selecting a jury began.

"It will cost the taxpayers \$60,000 to prosecute this robbery charge, and it's just a waste of

time, because I shouldn't be tried for little things like robberies," Kadens said.

Schuster Estate Valued at \$25,000

Henry Schuster, pioneer farmer from the town of York, who died Aug. 9, left an estate of \$25,000, according to the petition for probate filed in county court Monday.

Schuster left a personal estate of \$19,000; real estate worth \$6,000, and no debts. Frank Schuster, a son, was named executor.

Heirs are six sons, William, Frank, Emanuel, Charles, and Edward, Marshall, and Leonard, Verona, and four daughters, Mary Alderson, Laura Schuster, and Josephine Schuster Collier, Marshall, and Emma Schuster Krenzinber, Juneau.

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10 Apprentices Change Status
