Comedians Play Tag With Corpses

Abbott And Costello Burlesque Movie Detectives In Laugh Hit

Those mixed up masters of mystery and pseudo sleuth, Abbott and Costello play tag with corpses and trade lasts with prospective cadavers in "Who Done It" currently exhibited at the Ohio theatre.

In burlesquing the noble art of being a detective, these zany fellows do everything in their ultra goofy semi-mayhem repertoire. All to good effect. The film's one of the best Abbott-Costello to date.

How Japanese saboteurs operated in the United States and how they were foiled in some of their operations is revealed in the film, "Little Tokyo" displayed at the Quilna theatre. Preston Foster and Brenda Joyce are in the featured roles. The second attraction at the Quilna presents a Hollywood version of what the love life of a famous fantastic story writer should have been. It is entitled "The Loves of Edgar Allan Poe." Linda Darnell is cast in the role of the wife of the slightly psychopathic author. The title role is carried by John Shepperd.

That peel-to-the-buff artist of the burly circuits, Ann Corio gets uptown again and goes into more movies. As is the custom she slips into something comfortable and out of doors to do a long-hair tall timber opera called "Jungle Siren." "Muscles" Buster Crabbe plays opposite this acme of feminine assembly. On the musical side, and delightfully plotless, is "Priorities on Parade," the companion feature at the Quilna.

The man who isn't there goes to work on the nasty Axis gentry in "The Invisible Agent" another yarn based upon the amazing activities of that transparent character the Invisible Man. This fine film is viewable at the State theatre. Also at the State is "We Were Dancing."

Those sagebrush rascals, George Houston, Al St. John and Smokey Moore will more than satisfy the most thrill loving fan in "Border Roundup." The routine is practically continuous in this picture, and along with the quaint antics of the three range buddies, that's gold mine business that's something. Likewise showing is "The Mexican Spitfire Sees a Ghost," a terrific tale featuring that Charleston era hotcha girl, Lupe Velez and Charles "Buddy" Rogers.

Gay Sisters Starting On State Screen

"The Gay Sisters" starring its local run at the State theatre Sunday, has everything that makes for fine green entertainment—a swift-moving story—a fine cast—romance—intrigue and brilliant dialogue.

Starting in the film is Barbara Stanwyck as the fiery impetuous Fiona Gaylor, head of the famous family. The picture introduces a new-comer, one Gig Young, who was acclaimed so wholeheartedly by previous audiences that Warner decided to adapt his character name as the one by which he will be known to movie patrons from now on and all indications are that Gig Young is a name which will gain much prominence in the near future.

The two other sisters in the Gaylor family, Lady Burton and Susanna, are played by Geraldine Fitzgerald and Nancy Coleman respectively. Fitzgerald is excellent as a high-pitched woman who

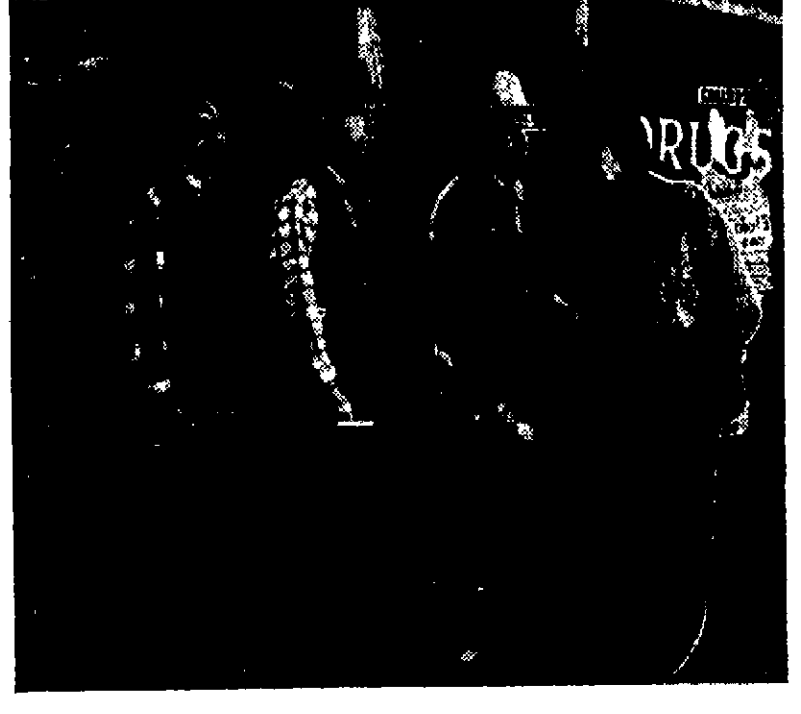


GRID STAR, COEDS

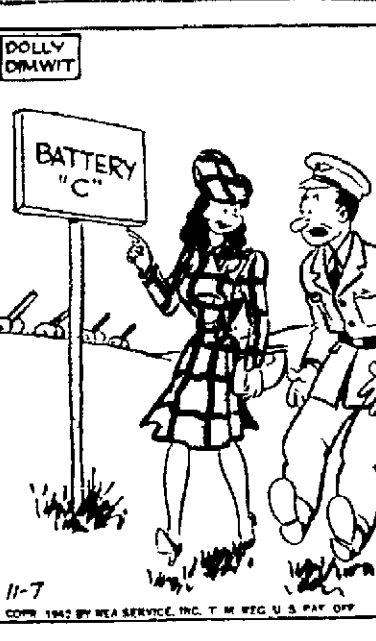

Seventh Observance Of Commonwealth Week Planned; Radio Also Will Honor Marines On Birthday

Special tribute to one of the most courageous allies of the United States will be paid by the Quiz Kids during their program Sunday at 7:30 p. m., over WJZ when they honor two representatives of the Philippine Islands.

The broadcast, which will salute the seventh observance of "Philippine Commonwealth Week", will feature a brief message from J. M. Elizalde, resident commissioner of the Philippines in the United States. He will speak from Washington, D. C.

The other guest of honor, who will appear personally, will be Rudy Vergara, 13-year old Philippine high school freshman who lives in Chicago. Born in the islands, he specializes in current events and history. His father is a graduate of the civil engineering school at the University of Illinois, and his mother is a graduate nurse.

Regulars on the program will be Jack Lucal, 15; Margaret Merrick, Claude Brenner and Jim Watson, all 14. Joe Kelly will be chief quizzer.

The world's toughest fighting outfit, the United States Marine Corps, will be too busy with current engagements to celebrate the 167th anniversary of its founding Nov. 10 but NBC will pay its tribute to the Leathernecks, nevertheless, with a special broadcast, "Hail, the Marines!"
