

Bette Davis Portrays Role Of Neurotic In New Film

"Now, Voyager" Plays At Ohio, With Romantic Viennese Actor Playing One Of Leading Characters

Co-starred with Bette Davis in her new film, "Now, Voyager," currently at the Ohio theatre, is the romantic Viennese actor, Paul Henreid, with a brilliant supporting cast made up of such film favorites as Claude Rains, Gladys Cooper, Bonita Granville and Ilka Chase. Miss Davis appears in a unique role as the neurotic daughter of a strict New England daughter.

James Ellison and Virginia Bruce have an exciting time of it with a gang of Axis spies in "Careful, Soft Shoulders," new suspense thriller coming to the Quilna theatre Friday evening at the preview program.
