## NEW WAR TIRE TO APPEAR SOON

### Oil Researcher Says Synthetic Rubber Industry Is Here To Stay

CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—(INS) — A war tire manufactured from reclaimed rubber which will give satisfactory service up to 35 miles an hour will be put on the market soon, the Standard Oil Co. announced today.

Officials said the new tire, now in production, will be for sale as soon as the government authorizes its distribution. With tires from reclaimed rubber soon to relieve the shortage to some extent, it was predicted today that within four or five years tires from synthetic rubber will have replaced the natural rubber tires to an important extent.

Dr. Gustav Egloss, director of research for the Universal Oil Products Co., asserted that within this period the petroleum industry will be producing synthetic rubber for tires capable of running 100,000 miles.

The reclaimed rubber tires soon to be on the market will have the same outward appearance as ordinary tires except that they will be stenciled "war time." Cord used previously will be continued, to insure the reclaimed rubber tire, against failure from carcass brittleness and to permit a higher percentage of recapping.

Buyers of the new product will be required to present a tire certificate from the rationing boards. According to present information, the Standard Oil Co. said, even a holder of an "A" gasoline ration book can obtain a new war tire certificate.

## UAW CERTIFIED BY NLRB AS BARGAINING AGENCY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—(UP)—The National Labor Relations Board today certified the United Automobile Workers (CIO) as collective bargaining agent for the Lenox Furnace Co., Lima, O., as the result of an election held Nov. 12.

The board announced following the election that the UAW received 88 votes and the Steiner Employees-amen 75 in the election. The total vote cast was 174, with eight challenged, one void and two blanks.

## WORK-OR-JAIL IS BIG SUCCESS IN HONOLULU

HONOLULU, Nov. 25.—(UP)—Honolulu has discovered a new solution to the vagrancy problem. Police no longer send snickers and loafers to jail. Whenever possible they put them to work.

So far, the police department's special "vag detail" has "assisted" 1,850 jobless men in finding war work. The jobs were there—the "vag" squad saw to it they were filled. Police Chief W. A. Gabrielson organized the "vag" squad simultaneously with his public warning that "those who don't work and won't work will go to jail."

The results have been amazing. Six hundred men have been put to work on defense jobs, 400 were placed in private essential employment and 400 were "persuaded" to return to their original jobs after varying periods of unauthorized "loafing."

Sixty-three others, most of them habitual loafers, were arrested and sent to provost court. Their sentences ranged from five days to one year.

## NATION OFFERS 6,000,000 TONS OF SCRAP IRON

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—(AP)—More than 6,000,000 tons of iron and steel and other scrap for manufacture into tanks, ships, planes and guns were credited today to the new scrap metal drive by Richard W. Slocum, chairman of the campaign. Slocum said that although the official collection ended more than a month ago, many drives still were in progress in some states. Newspapers in other areas, he added, were continuing salvage collections.

Because of these continued campaigns, he explained, it was impossible to compile complete totals although the national average already is nearly 82 pounds for every man, woman and child. Kansas led the states in today's compilation with 158.7 pounds for every citizen, or a total of 142,874 tons. Ohio reported 104.2 pounds per capita and a total tonnage of 360,000 tons.
