

Prospects Better for Settling **Production Fight**

Nelson, Stimson Reported Nearing Compromise Battle

WASHINGTON - (U.P.) - War Production Chairman Donald M. Nelson and Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson were reported today to have made progress in compromising a battle between their two agencies over future control of arms production.

Some quarters understood that settlement was imminent. Differences are said to be fundamental and to strike at the heart of the

multi-billion dollar arms program Nelson intends to place complete authority over all phases of production in WPB Vice-chairman Charles E. Wilson, former president of General Electric Co. He would withdraw from the armed services power over one of the most vital phases of productionscheduling-which he delegated to the army and navy last March. The nation failed to meet Pres.
