





What you should know about Gasoline Rationing

A simplified guide to help you with things you may have overlooked

{Read this—clip out—save for future reference}

BEFORE YOU BUY GASOLINE:

On Front Cover of Ration Book-write in, in the space provided, the serial number of the Use Tax Stamp on your car (except on interchangeable books issued for fleet or official vehicles).

On Inside Back Cover-sign your name and address in the spaces provided. On Back of Coupons-the license number of your

car and the name of the state issuing the license must be written in ink on the back of each coupon before the gasoline dealer can accept it. EXAMPLE: XX-700 Ohio.

(In the case of official or fleet vehicles, write in the official or fleet designation (or in case of a commercial vehicle, write in the Certificate of War Necessity Num-ber if there is no fleet designation) and state and city in which principal office of fleet operator is located.) (In the case of E and R books, or bulk coupons, simply sign your name and address on the back of the coupons as it appears on the front cover of the ration book.) Ration Sticker-every holder of an A, B, C, or T

ration book (except one representing a Special Ration) must display on his car the sticker identifying his class of ration. Persons having a ration above Class A should only display the sticker identifying the higher classification. In Ohio, the law calls for stickers to be placed

in the lower right hand corner of the windshield.

DETACHED COUPONS ARE VOID

Only the dealer who sells gasoline to you may detach the coupons from your book. Any coupons you remove yourself become void, and he is not permitted to accept them.

COUPONS GOOD ONLY FOR SPECIFIED PERIODS "A" Book. Contains 4 pages, each consisting of 8 coupons. Coupons on each page bear a different number, and are good only during specified

periods, as follows: No. 3 COUPONS-Good only through Jan. 21, 1943

> No. 4 COUPONS-Good only from Jan. 22 through Mor. 21, 1943

> No. 5 COUPONS-Good only from Mar. 22 through May 21, 1943 No. 6 COUPONS-

Good only from May 22 through July 21, 1943 NOTE: Coupons may be used only during the specified

periods—with no overlapping. All Other Ration Classifications. Coupons are good at any time up to expiration date shows on front cover of ration book.

HOW THE COUPONS WORK

When you go to a dealer to get gasoline, tell him how much gasoline you want and band your coupon book to him-He is required to check the license number appear-

ing on the coupon book against your license plates. He must also check the sticker on your car to see that it covers the type of ration book that you present-and must check the back of the coupons to see that you have written in the required data (as explained above in the section headed "On Back of Coupons").

The dealer then detaches the proper number of coupons from your book to cover the amount of gasoline ordered before the gasoline is put in The dealer is not allowed to sell you gasoline unless all of these conditions are met.

How Many? Your coupons may be used in any manner you wish-one at a time or several at a time—within the period during which they are

Unused Coupons. Any coupons which are not used prior to the fixed expiration date are void and are to be returned to your Ration Board within 5 days after their expiration date.

Don't over-order. Before getting gasoline, always be sure your tank will hold the amount ordered -because the dealer detaches the coupons before the gas is put in, and they then become void. If you order less gasoline than the amount allowed per coupon, the dealer must still detach the full

LOST OR DESTROYED COUPONS

Guard your book carefully. If it is lost, stolen or destroyed, conclusive evidence and affidavits are required by the Rationing Board before you can secure a duplicate.

Any coupon book or coupons you may find should be turned in to a Ration Board within 5 days for return to the owner or proper disposal.

IF YOU DISPOSE OF YOUR CAR

Your ration book is not transferable. If you sell your on it goes out of service, the book must be turned over to your Local Board within 5 days.

IF YOU BUY A CAR AFTER RATIONING BEGINS Go to your local Rationing Board to make an application for a coupon book for that car-

IN CASE OF EMERGENCY

If you run out of gasoline on the road, you may obtain gasoline in a container from a dealer by leaving your ration book with him until you return to the station.

If you require gasoline to meet an emergency involving serious threat to life, health or property, you may obtain it from a dealer by signing an Emergency Receipt on the official OPA form provided for that purpose.

CHANGE IN STATUS

Holders of other than basic "A" rations are required to surrender any coupons and books they hold, in the event the use for which those rations were issued ceases. This must be done within 5 days of such date at the issuing Board. Similarly, if a change in status qualifies you for additional rations, you may apply to your Local Board at any time.

RENEWAL OF RATIONS

Application for renewal of a B. C. T or other supplemental ration may be made at any time within 30 days prior to the expiration date of that ration.

DENIAL OF RATIONS A gasoline ration may be denied any person who refuses to surrender a ration card, book, coupon or other evidences upon direction of the Board -or for failure or refusal, without showing good cause, to appear before the Board for examination

when so requested.

HOW REGULAR TIRE INSPECTION AFFECTS YOUR GASOLINE AND TIRE RATIONS

Rationing regulations require that you have your tires inspected regularly by an official OPA inspection station. Many SOHIO Stations are authorized

You must keep your Tire Inspection Record (the slip showing your tire numbers, which you received when you applied for a gas rationing coupon book) in your car at all times.

First passenger car tire inspection period is between December 1, 1942, and January 31, 1943, during which time all vehicles must have their tires inspected by an authorized OPA inspector. After the first inspection, A and basic-D drivers

must have tires inspected every 4 months with inspections at least 60 days apart. B, C, and supplemental-D drivers must have tires inspected every 2 months with inspections at least 30 days apart. Cost of inspection—a charge of 25¢ per vehicle is permitted if no tires are removed. 50¢ per tire is allowed if it is necessary that they be removed. If tires are okay, the inspector will sign your

Record. If he finds repairs to tires, tubes, or vehicle necessary for tire conservation, he is not allowed to sign the Record until you carry out the recommendations. The tire inspector may recommend a recap-in which case the tire must be removed from the wheel to complete the inspection. If your tire is not fit for recapping, he may recommend replacement.

of tire abuse to the Local Board. You apply to your Local Board for a Rationing Certificate if the inspector recommends a recapping service for your tire, or a new or used tire or tube. These cannot be obtained without a Rationing Certificate.

In all cases, he is required to report any evidence

SPECIAL NOTE: Commercial Vehicles. Periodic tire inspections are required every 5,000 miles or every 60 days, whichever comes first,, beginning November 15, 1942.

BE CAREFUL! Rationing Boards are empowered to deny both gasoline and tires to car owners who—

-Violete the 35-mile-per-hour speed limit, or are found to be guilty of any form of fire ebuss. —Fall to have Official Tire Inspections made at the times specified.

—Transfer gasoline to or from the tenks of their cors in violation of the regulations under which their ration was issued.
