Prima Orchestra Listed For Ohio Stage On Tuesday; Other Screens Offer Interesting Attractions

Louis Prima and his orchestra will appear on the Ohio theatre stage on Tuesday thru arrangements with Music Corporation of America.

Prima, one of the greatest trumpet players in the world, is not only a musician of international note, but he has proven his worth as a movie actor as well. He appeared in such production as "You Can't Have Everything," "Rose of Washington Square," "Rhythm On the Range," "Start Cheering," "Manhattan Merry-Go-Round."

Prima has also won wide fame as a composer and is the author of the novelty hits "Sing a Spell," "Sing Sing Sing," "Where Have We Met Before," "Yes, There Ain't No Moonlight Tonight," "Lookout," "Percy Have Mercy," and "Be Happy."

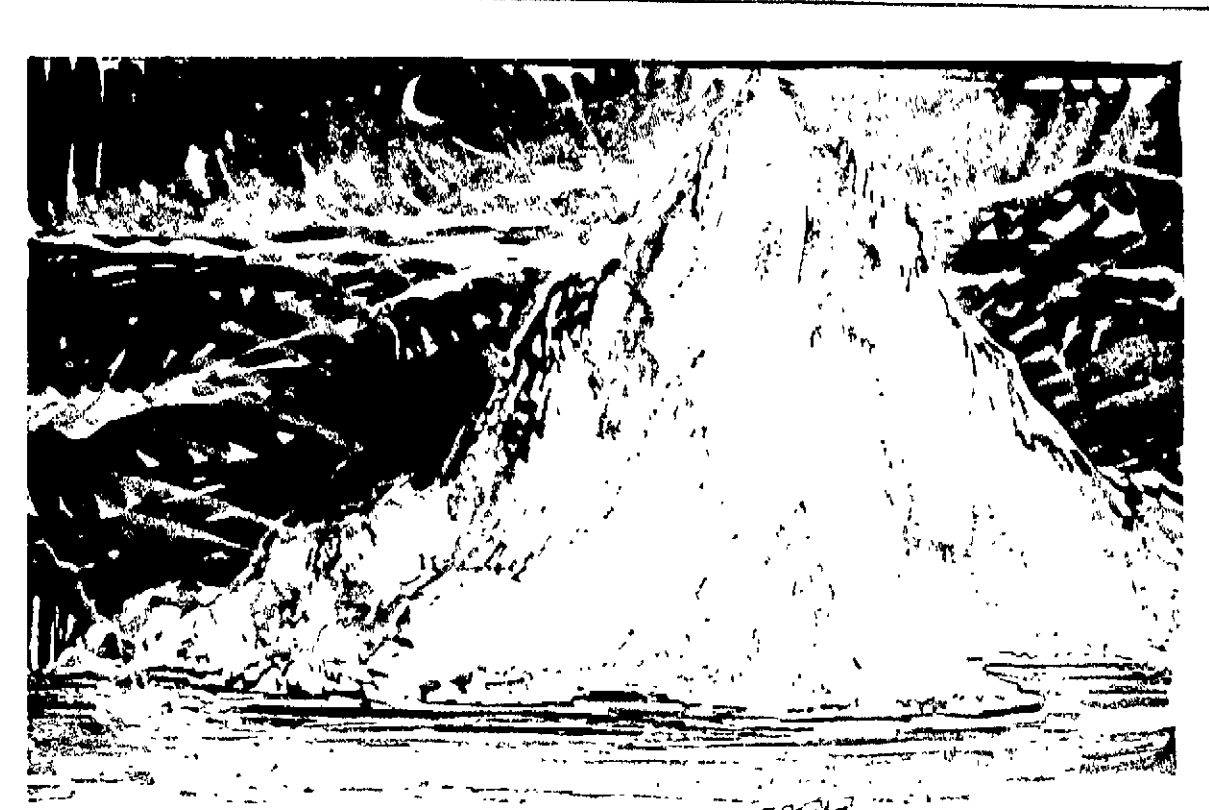

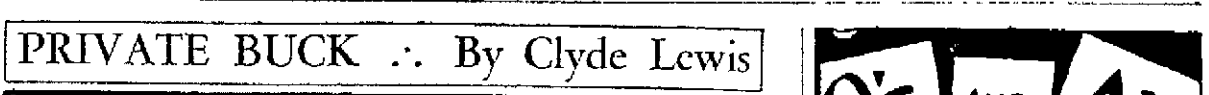

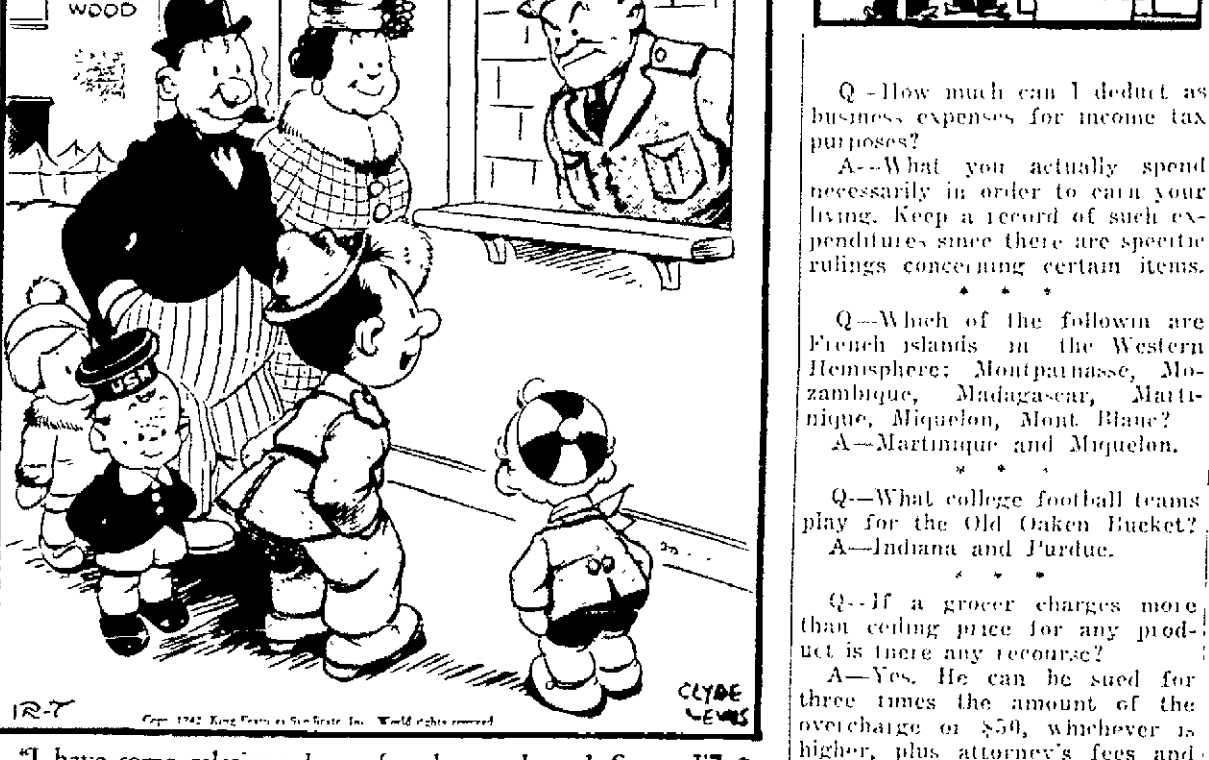

Launching Of Battleship New Jersey On Air Monday

Programs To Center Around Observance Of First Anniversary Of Jap Attack At Pearl Harbor

Marking the anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Kate Smith and Ted Collins will broadcast their daytime program direct from the Philadelphia Navy yard, scene of the launching of the U. S. S. New Jersey, largest warship ever built, Dec. 7, at 12 noon over WABC.

"Sweetheart," title song from the Victor Herbert operetta, has been selected by Dorothy Kirsten, glamorous young opera lark, for her solo feature Dec. 7 (WEAF, 10 p. m.). She also will be heard with Reinhold Schmidt, basso, and Earle Tanner, tenor, in the finale duo from "Faust."

Celebration of a special requiem mass commemorating the first anniversary of the treacherous Jap assault on Pearl Harbor, will be held in Pearl Harbor arena, will be carried in part over WJZ, Dec. 7, from 4:15 to 4:30 p. m.

Carl Sandburg is starred in his own "Cavalade of America" play, "Victory's Road," on Dec. 7 (WEAF, 8 p. m.). The broadcast, in which Sandburg acts as narrator, marks the anniversary of the Japs' sneak attack on Pearl Harbor.

A sailor who survived the Pearl Harbor attack on Dec. 7, 1941, will tell why he believes with President Roosevelt, that the Jap move set a new high in infamy, on the "Men of the Land, Sea and Air" broadcast of Dec. 7, at 3:45 p. m. over WJZ. The seaman is Frank Stevens, 20, of Cedar Lane, Tex., a boiler-maker, second class.

Replacing Violinist Jascha Heifetz, whose scheduled appearance was cancelled, Helen Traubel, Metropolitan Opera soprano, is guest soloist for the second time in the "Telephone Hour" Great Artists Series Dec. 7 (WEAF, 9 p. m.).

Van Johnson, who starred in the film "The War Against Mrs. Hadley," will recreate the role of Mike Fitzgerald in Cecil B. DeMille's radio theatre adaptation of the picture Dec. 7 at 9 p. m. over WABC.

An attack on the doubters of our war effort will be boosted by the radio pastor, Dr. Rutledge of "Guiding Light," on that program Dec. 7 (WEAF, 2:30 p. m.), marking the close of the first year of war for this country.

USO INCREASES SHOW PROGRAM FOR SERVICES

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—(UP)—A soldier stationed in one of the larger army camps this winter will have the opportunity to see 17 different shows, admission free, during the 22-week winter season of the USO-Camp Shows opening today. Even the "forgotten men" in small detachments or stationed in far-away outposts will, for the first time this season, get first-class professional entertainment thru 36 newly-organized "Tabloid Troupes" prepared to perform indoors or outdoors, with or without stage facilities.

With a total of 70 different shows running on all circuits this winter, the scope of the program will be three times that of last winter and four times that of last summer. Thousands of service men will see "live talent" shows for the first time in their lives, and other thousands will for the first time see legitimate theatre shows and hear renowned concert artists in person. Successful plays to be presented on the USO-Camp Shows circuit include "Room Service," "Claudia," "You Can't Take It With You," "Junior Miss," "Arsenic and Old Lace," "The Male Animal" and "The First Year."

In addition, there will be 22 musicals as "Shuffle Along," "Hit the Deck" and "Helloppin'." and performances of four concert companies.

As the agency officially designated by the Army and Navy to entertain service men anywhere, USO Camp Shows is also expanding its overseas program to entertain more and more troops outside the continental United States.
