

NEW SONG: "Here Come the Waves," a feminine version of the navy's official marching song, "Anchors Aweigh," has been written by five enlisted WAVES attending the naval training schools for radio operators, on the campus of the University of Wisconsin.

Sung to the tune of the traditional navy march, the new song is gaining rapidly in popularity among the school's 470 girls in blue who like to harmonize on the verses as they march in military formation to and from their classes.

The girls stationed here are learning how to send and receive radio messages in international code. After 16 weeks of intensive training they will be assigned to naval shore stations, freeing enlisted men for sea duty. Mary Carpenter, East Cleveland, O., had the original idea for composing the song. Then she and four schoolmates went to work and




