Japs' Cruiser Lost in Guinea

Shelling Fails Against MacArthur

GEN. MACARTHUR'S HEAD-QUARTERS, Australia.—(U.P.)—The Japanese have lost another cruiser to the Allied air force in New Guinea, and failed in an attempt to shell Gen. Douglas MacArthur's ground forces out of Buna village, it was revealed today.

While Liberator bombers of the Allied force were blasting the cruiser in the Harbor of Rabaul, New Britain, and bombing Japanese air bases at Finsch-Hafen, New Guinea, and on Timor island, MacArthur's ground forces deepened their wedge in the Japanese beach head below Buna.

A headquarters spokesman said that in the beach fighting Sunday night and Monday, the Japanese suffered "considerable casualties" in their first attempt to meet the Allied force outside prepared positions since the siege began.

The Jap shelling failed to damage Allied installations and the sally was beaten back with the net result that American units deepened the wedge which, at Gairopa point, separates the Japanese forces at the mission and around what the enemy has left of its last strip.

Food 'Freeze' Made Threat

Officials Plan to Block Run on Canned Goods

WASHINGTON.—(U.P.)—Rationing authorities indicated today that, if necessary, they might "freeze" the sale of all canned goods to forestall any threat of widespread panic buying.

Americans generally, they said, appeared to be heeding the government's "no hoarding" appeal. But they admitted that buying waves had developed in some parts of the country which, if continued, might require quick and drastic action.

The government's appeal was made in a broadcast Sunday night by Secretary of Agriculture Claude E. Wickard after an announcement that all canned, dried, and frozen fruits and vegetables will be rationed on a "point" system in February.

High rationing authorities conferred Monday on action to be taken if a general run should develop. A general "freeze" on all sales was regarded as the most likely countermeasure.

There still was no indication at all that the final canned goods ration will be Wickard indicated that total supplies in 1943 would not exceed 3 pounds per person. Officials said it would be erroneous to assume that the ration will

Police Hunt Mad Dogs in N. Y. State

Officials Plan to Block Run on Canned Goods

NEW CITY, N. Y.—(U.P.)—Police with high-powered rifles began hunting dogs today in an effort to stop a rabies epidemic.

The hunt extended over most of the county. Most of the dogs they sought to kill were former pets, now running wild in packs and killing deer like wolves. They sought only dogs "at large"—that is without visible means of support.

Twenty or more persons and 50 animals have been bitten by mad dogs recently, and, although many infected animals have been killed, cases of dog bite have steadily increased.

Persons who have been bitten have been warned they must immediately seek treatment, and owners of dogs have been told to have their pets inoculated and keep them muzzled.

Chinese Executed By Japs Because 'Thoughts' Are Bad

Officials Plan to Block Run on Canned Goods

CHUNKING.—(U.P.)—A "large number" of Chinese puppet troops have been executed and imprisoned in North China for "gangsterous thoughts" or "communicating with bandits" in the latest Japanese move to expand and reorganize its North China command and the Japanese have strengthened their grip on 500 to between 1,000 and 1,500 in each district.

Chinese guerrillas reported that the Japanese called their latest purge a "purification." They said Japanese political officers, attached to all military units, were instructed to "watch the thoughts" of the puppet troops.

Army Bombs Jap Supplies in Solomons

Officials Plan to Block Run on Canned Goods

WASHINGTON.—(U.P.)—The navy announced today that Army Air Corps fighters bombed and strafed enemy supplies dropped by parachute for Japanese forces on the beach at Tassafaronga about 10 miles west of Henderson airfield on Guadalcanal island.

A communique said that aerial observers on Dec. 27 (south Pacific time) discovered about 30 cargo laden parachutes on the Tassafaronga beach.

It was believed to be the first time the Japanese have attempted to supply their troops on Guadalcanal by air.

The communique said that "Dauntless" dive bombers and "Aircobra" fighters also bombed and strafed a Japanese bivouac area northwest of Kokumbona, about eight miles west of the Guadalcanal airfield.

The navy added that additional reports of an attack by dive bombers from Guadalcanal on enemy shipping south of Vangunu island in the New Georgia group of the Solomons disclosed that a second enemy ship—besides a vessel of 3,000 tons reported destroyed in yesterday's communique—also was sunk in that attack. The communique also said the attack occurred Dec. 26 (south Pacific time) instead of Dec. 25 as previously reported.
