WASHINGTON -- (U.P.) -- Milk narkets must cut their distribution costs as part of a general program to hold down the price of food, Food Administrator Claude R. Wickard said Tuesday.

Economies in other commodities may also be necessary along the line of economies recently imposed in the processing and marketing of bakery products, he warned.

Detrails of the milk program will be announced within a few days, to become effective about Jan. 15.

### **Board Defers Action on Building Site**

Pending study of a proposed joint East side service building for city departments after the war, the city board of water commissioners deferred action Monday night on Supt. Leon A. Smith's recommendation that the Well-man property at E. Main and S. Paterson sts. be purchased as a water department service building

Smith expressed belief that if a joint building is established east of the Yahara river the site will be too far distant to serve the water department adequately.

Smith's monthly report showed December pumpage, totaling 293, 432 gallons of water, averaged 9,450,000 gallons daily compared with 8,200,000 a day in December 1941. Total pumpage of 3,489,-102,000 gallons in 1942, setting an all-time record, exceeded the 1941 total by more than 80,000,000 gallons. Pumpage cost of \$28.84 cents a million gallons was 84 cents higher than the 1941 expense, Smith said.

## We'll Meet Shipping Goal,

WASHINGTON-(U.P.)-Admiral Emory S. Land, chairman of the maritime commission, predicted Tuesday that the original merchant shipbuilding goal of 16,000,000 tons set for 1943 will be surpassed if steel and other required materials are made available.

Land made this forecast at a press conference in which Admiral Howard L. Vickery, commission vice chairman, participated. Vickery said the War Production Board's new controlled mate-

rials plan has been the best thing thus far done in an effort to relieve the steel shortage which has held back building in the past and is the chief threat for the future. Under this plan, Vickery said,
