

THEATRES PLAN SALUTE TO ALL ALLIED POWERS

United Nations Week Will Be Launched in Lima And Nation Jan. 14

A special salute to the Allied nations fighting in this global war will usher in United Nations Week on Jan. 14 in all Lima theatres according to J. Wallace (Doc) Elliott manager of Warner's Ohio theatre and Allen-co chairman of the theatre industry on war activities.

The motion picture industry is sponsoring the special national-wide event. The local committee Elliott said, has been working several weeks on the program for this celebration. He said special events have been planned for every day of United Nations Week from the 14th thru the 20th.

Elliott explained that the observance of the week has a two-fold purpose: to bring home to every American the importance of the solidarity of the United Nations not only in winning the war but in safeguarding the peace and to aid in a material way the victims of Axis brutality.

Lima theatres are joining with more than 16,000 other theatres throughout the United States in this United Nations Week and every possible means will be used to make the week of Jan. 14 a truly great one for every American. "All For One Great Cause" is the slogan adopted for the national celebration and will be the keynote for the local celebrators, Elliott said.

As a special tribute to United Nations Week the Postoffice Department is issuing a new two-cent stamp which will go on sale for the first time Jan. 14. It carries the slogan: "Nations United For Victory." Other government agencies are aiding in the United Nations Week effort and the Office of War Information is supplying more than five million pieces of literature for distribution during the week.

A special short film, "You, John Jones," has been produced for showings during the week in all theatres. James Cagney Ann Sheridan and 5-year-old Margaret O'Brien are the stars of the picture which was directed by Mervyn LeRoy from a story written by Carey Wilson. The Metro Goldwyn Mayer company produced the film and 1,200 prints, a record number, will be distributed throughout the country.

The 16,000 theatres cooperating in the observance of United Nations week have arranged for special stage programs for the event and the flags and pennants of the United Nations will be prominently displayed in all theatre lobbies. Tableaux, pageants, folk songs and dances and various musical presentations have been arranged to bring to more than 80,000,000 people during the week of January 14 the story of the life, manners customs and habits of the peoples of the United Nations, who are fighting with Americans for a free and better world after peace comes.

LIMA WOMAN TAKES POST IN SCHOOL AT ST. MARYS (Special To The Lima News) ST. 13,497 BAGS OF MAIL ARE CARRIED ON DELPHOS STAR ROUTES IN 1942

(Lima News Bureau) DELPHOS, Jan. 9—Old Man Statistics this week came into The Lima News office with a bundle of facts about postoffice mail and packages. "He" revealed that more than 10,000 mail bags had been delivered between here and Cloverdale during 1942. "Old Man Statistics" in this instance is John B. Lehmkuhle, former councilman, ex-council president, a second generation volunteer fireman here, dry cleaning operator and also the employe who transports the mail from Delphos to Ft. Jennings, Ottoville and Cloverdale as a star mail route carrier.

Leaving Delphos each work day during the year he carried 5,001 mail sacks to Ft. Jennings. Ottoville had 2,437 sacks and Cloverdale renoted delivery of 2,992 mail sacks there during the year, making a total of 10,430. Leaving Cloverdale at 5 p. m. daily, Lehmkuhle received 1,036 mail sacks at Cloverdale; 609 at Ottoville and 1,422 at Ft. Jennings for Delphos, that total being 3,067. The largest load during the year was on Oct. 16 when he had 59 sacks for the three towns. Lehmkuhle was unable to explain why so many sacks came at the beginning of the fall. On July 22, though, he had eight bags less—51—that proved the heaviest load of the year—2,300 pounds.

On the two days and on Dec. 24 the star route carrier, after filling the body of his truck, had to pile them on the roof, the running boards and radiator, managing with an effort to get the more than half a hundred sacks tied securely so that they would carry to their destination. Last year was the first complete 12 months that Lehmkuhle operated the route. He started July 1941 and for the first six months carried 5,644 bags of mail and parcel post.

USE OF PROCEEDS FROM BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION REVEALED BY CHAIRMAN

As tickets for Lima's annual President's Birthday celebration Jan. 30 in Memorial hall went on sale Saturday, Earl Ludwig, general chairman, gave an explanation of how proceeds from the event are distributed.

Fifty per cent of the proceeds, Ludwig said, are retained locally by the permanent Allen-co committee for local purposes, and 50 per cent goes to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Inc.

There is a balance of \$2,700 in the Allen-co Chapter fund, Ludwig said he has been advised by George B. Qantman, chairman of the county's permanent committee. This, Ludwig said, is sufficient to take care of current cases, but not sufficient if Allen-co should have an epidemic similar to epidemics which have been experienced in other counties.

Ludwig said he has been informed by Qantman that there never has been a case of infantile paralysis presented to the county committee, unable to take care of itself, that has not been cared for. Assistance in seven specific cases here is on record. In these cases, the local committee has provided medical attention, wheel chairs, braces of all kinds and other equipment and assistance. Ludwig explained that with the

funds turned over to the National Foundation work is constantly going on both in the field of prevention and in the field of cure. This work is divided up among the leading medical universities of the country so as to obtain the benefit of a number of different scientists working from different angles.

While on definite cure has been discovered thru medicines of serums, much progress has been made in the treatment of the disease by mechanical methods and surgery.

The experiments have also led to important discovery in the isolation of the germ and preventing its spread. Definite medical methods have been developed to prevent contraction of the virus, but not sufficient if contact, and it has been further found thru the results of this research work that the virus is excreted from the body thru bowel discharges of the patient no matter how mild the disease, and by this route the pollution has been carried to rivers.

While not as much progress has been achieved thru the funds that the public might hope for, yet scientists devoting their life to this work are in agreement that the infantile paralysis conditions of the country might be far worse today were it not for the discoveries made and the preventive measures taken, and thru the use of the funds unfortunate victims have been cared for to the extent that they are again able to do "useful things."

He also informed his mother that he received word sent him regarding the recent death of his father here.
