WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—(INS)—With some 8,000 instructors already drained from American colleges and universities by war activities, the U. S. Office of Education today urged professional men to ease the emergency shortage of teachers by taking on single courses in their specialty.

American institutes of higher learning have already revamped their curricula to war conditions by lengthening instructor's hours and curtailing less essential courses.

A recent survey revealed that half the colleges have adopted some of the following measures to ease their staff problems: Replacing men with women teachers, increasing salaries, retaining teachers beyond the retirement age and employing graduate assistants.

SPECIAL SPOT IS URGED FOR AUTO STICKERS

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 11.—(AP)—State Highway Director H. G. Souris made a long-range request today of Ohio's motorists—asking them to place the 1943 auto license in the lower right hand corner of their windshields.

Many drivers, Souris said, have placed their federal use stamps and gasoline rationing stickers in the lower right hand corner, but he wants them to replace the stamps and stickers with the state licenses in an effort to establish some uniformity.

Ohio's 1943 licenses will be merely paper stickers, metal license tags being discontinued for the duration of the war.
