

# "Hitler's Children" Comes Back To Sigma For New Run

### Thought-Provoking Film Will Show For Three Days; Ghost-Comedies Predominant In Other Screen Fare

The thrilling "Hitler's Children," which drew huge crowds to the Sigma all last week, returns to the Sigma theatre on Wednesday for a three-day run. An unusual piece of entertainment and a trenchant and provocative piece of serious propaganda, it stars Tim Holt, Bonita Granville and Kent Smith. "The Palm Beach Story" with Claudette Colbert and Joel McCrea, and "Gorilla Man," show thru Tuesday. Nearing the close of its run at the State is "Who Done It?" a laugh riot with Bud Abbott and Lou Costello. You'll see how these two comedians help solve a murder. Completing the bill is "Flying Fortress," one of the most thrilling aviation films of the season.

Glenn Ford made for a scene in the dramatic "Flight Lieutenant," with Pat O'Brien and Evelyn Keyes at the Quilna theatre, and the aerial leap he took four years ago. Ford's earlier jump was made from a 5,000-foot altitude for an advertising photographer, when the actor was a struggling unknown badly in need of the money. His parachute leap, in a scene with Pat O'Brien, was made from a 50-foot platform. The chute, for safety reasons, was of extra large size and was wide open before the start of the fall.

Returning to the Sigma Wednesday is "Hitler's Children," a thrilling hit and a trenchant and provocative piece of serious propaganda. It really began about 10 years ago when Gregor Ziemer, head of the American School in Berlin, commenced observing the rise of Nazi ideas and educational methods, and what they did to the impressionable German youth. Finally expelled from Germany, Ziemer condensed his experiences in the recent best-seller, "Education for Death," on which the picture is based.

Weaving a realistic and absorbing romance against the grim background of Hitlerism and its doctrines, the film shows what happens when a pair of idealistic youngsters are trapped in the meshes of the relentless Nazi machine and, unable to escape it themselves, make a gallant effort to enlighten their associates of its danger as they avoid the Nazi "Education for Death?" Tim Holt and Bonita Granville portray the two young people, and do it brilliantly, while Kent Smith, a talented new recruit from the stage, enacts a Ziemer-like role as the master of an American school in Germany, and thru him we learn much of the story. Such noted players as Otto Kruger and H. B. Warner contribute splendid support performances to this remarkable film, which was directed by Edward Dmytryk and produced by Edward Goldyn.

Boris Karloff and Peter Lorre, filmworld's greatest master of menace, had themselves a field day during production on "The Boogie Man Will Get You," hilarious new comedy at the Lyric theatre. The chiller-diller presents Karloff as a poisonous professor who "kills" six people, only to discover that he really didn't. Peter Lorre as a delightful rascal who convinces his way into anything that looks like money. To the stars, the film was a great chance from the sombre thrillers in which they usually appear.

The entire cast and crew signed a pledge not to divulge the mechanics of the vanishing woman stunt performed by Dante, the world's most famous magician, in Laurel and Hardy's newest comedy, "A-Haunting We Will Go," currently at the Lyric theatre. Sheila Ryan is the disappearing beauty in the film, but she reappears happily to share romantic honors with John Sheffield. The featured cast also includes Don Costello and Elisha Cook, Jr.

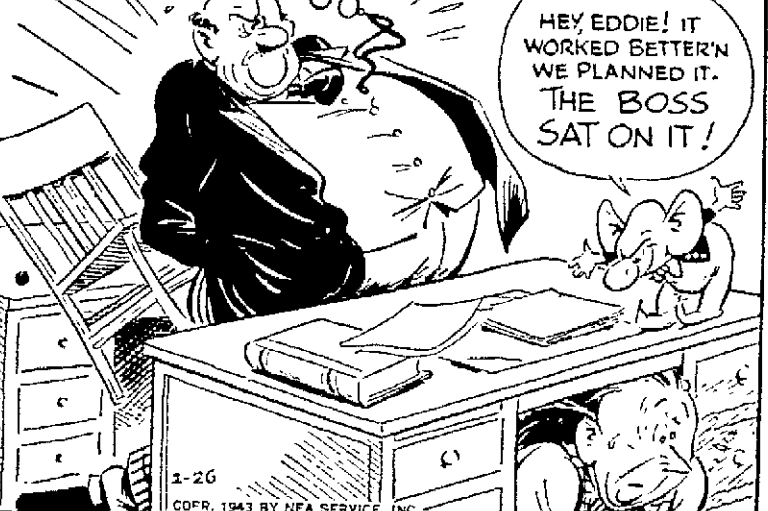
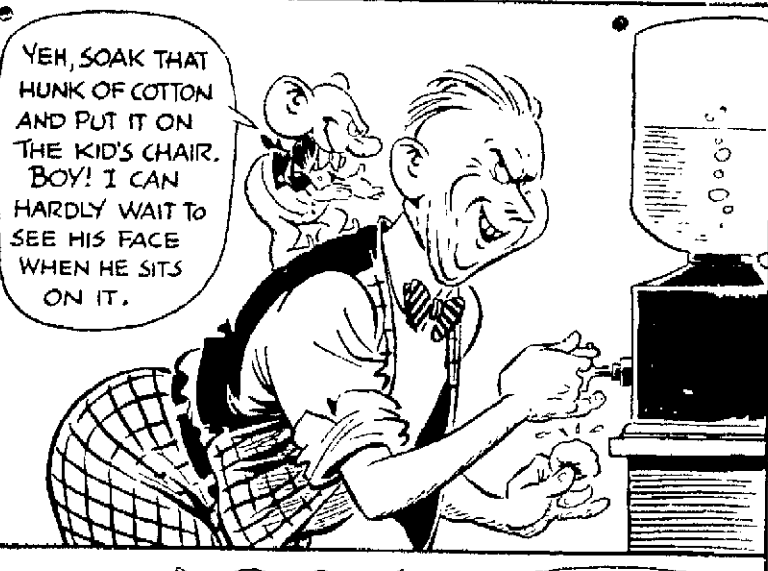

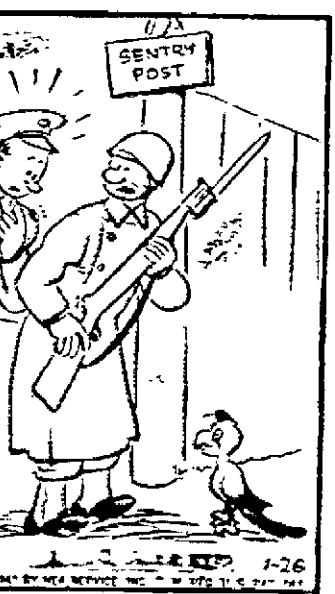
