

"Newest Music Sensations" Billed At Ohio Thursday

Bob Chester And His Orchestra To Appear For One Day; "My Heart Belongs To Daddy" Is On Screen

On the Ohio stage Thursday will be Bob Chester and his orchestra, termed the nation's newest musical sensations. Appearing with the band leader will be the lovely Betty Bradley, one of the finest feminine singers of the day. Richard Carlson and Martha O'Driscoll will be seen in the screen hit, "My Heart Belongs to Daddy." Commencing Friday at the Ohio will be "Once Upon a Honeymoon," starring Gary Grant and Ginger Rogers.

The Quilna will show "A Night to Remember" at its Friday night preview. Lovely, talented Lovelita Young is starred with Brian Aherne in the new mythical murder mystery. The co-stars appear as husband and wife who do a bit of amateur sleuthing when they discover a corpse in their backyard.

Currently flashing on the Sigma screen are "Kid Dynamite" and "Fighting Frontier." The East-Side Kids have leading roles in the first hit while in the western production Tim Holt has many thrills and fights.

Heir to one of America's largest fortunes—Bob's step-father is Albert Fisher, retired president of the Fisher Body Corp., of Detroit, he has preferred the "hard road to success" rather than a position and life of ease.

It was while Bob was attending the University of Dayton that he first became interested in modern music and he read and devoured anything about his idols, Bix Beiderbecke, George Gershwin, and Dorsey and others.

As an undergraduate, Bob starred as pitcher on the Dayton team, claiming a one hit shutout for his supreme achievement. Despite offers from several major league scouts, including the Detroit Tigers and Boston Red Sox, music and the tenor saxophone were more important and he chose music instead of baseball.

Upon leaving school he joined several New York bands, before becoming afflicted with the desire to organize his own group. In 1935 he returned to his home city of Detroit, got a group of unknown musicians together, whipped them into shape, and secured a job at the Detroit Athletic club which lasted for eight months. From there he climbed up and up, until today he is definitely slated for a top spot among the nation's orchestras.

Something new in laughter is assured Quilna theatre audiences when the merry, mirth-filled murder mystery, "A Night to Remember," opens on Friday night. Lovelita Young and Brian Aherne are co-starred in the gay new comedy which recounts their giddy goings-on in Greenwich Village where, between kisses, they hunt killers!
