'Sugar' Ray Is Given Furlough, Fights Friday

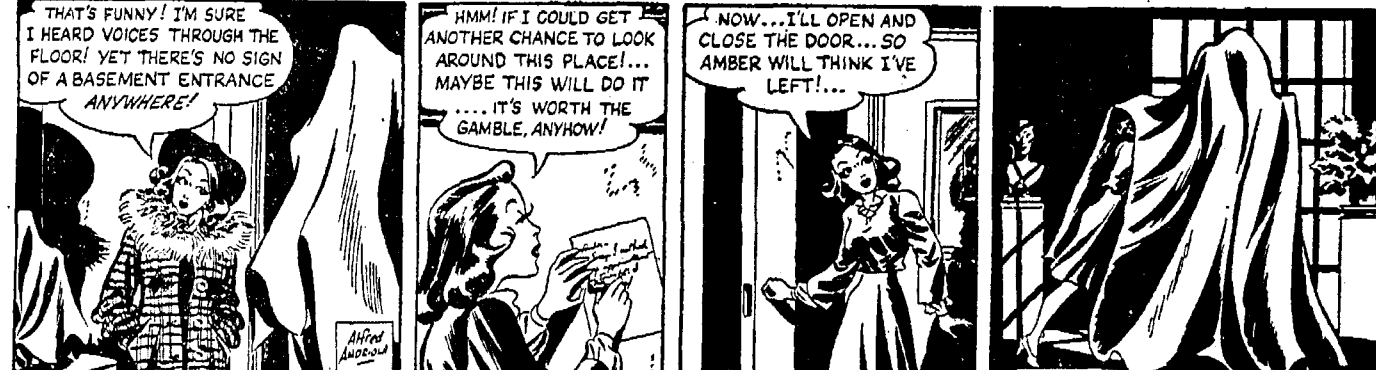
