





FOSSILS TELL STORY OF AGE a foot or two tall, but others grew OF FERNS

time often called the "Age of ground to the top. Ferns."

There is good reason for that name. The period was a time not live on earth during the Age of great growth for ferns. They of Ferns. covered the land, far and wide, even around the Arctic Circle. They were among the very early forms of plant life, and they grow well in the moist, warm climate which the earth then enioved.
