

POMEROY BRIDGE WILL BE FIRST TO DROP TOLLS

Span Income Gains 188.6 Per Cent In 1942 For Record In State

COLUMBUS, O., March 13 (AP)—On the basis of 1942 revenues from the Ohio river bridge at Pomeroy, the State Bridge Commission estimated today the span would be toll-free in 1946.

Tolls paid at the bridge in 1942 gained 188.6 per cent over 1941, a record in the state, the commission reported.

By contrast, revenues from the three other bridges showed decreases. The Sandusky bay bridge dropped 23.8 per cent over the previous year and the Ohio river spans at Steubenville and East Liverpool dropped 23.8 and 32 per cent, respectively.

Ray Palmer, commission-secretary, said war workers traveling to and from the General Chemical Defense Corp. at Point Pleasant, W. Va., accounted for the boost at Pomeroy.

Palmer reported gross revenue from the bridge at Pomeroy was \$120,338 in 1942, compared with \$41,677 in 1941. The commission retained \$42,000 in bonds on the bridge in 1942, \$14,000 more than in the previous five years.

Palmer said some \$48,000 in bonds would be called next April 1 and a larger amount next Oct. 1. Bonds outstanding now total \$280,000.

"At the present earnings, we should be able to retire those bonds in three years," Palmer said.

Gross revenue from the Sandusky bay bridge dropped from \$295,774 in 1941 to \$228,522 last year. A total of \$166,000 in bonds was retired last year, leaving \$781,000 outstanding.

Revenue on the Steubenville span decreased from \$299,426 to \$198,292. Bonds retired totaled \$145,000, leaving \$845,000 outstanding. The East Liverpool gross dipped from \$269,320 to \$185,288. Bonds retired totaled \$125,000, leaving \$1,690,000 outstanding.

INSPECTION OF TIRES STILL IS REQUIRED

Periodic tire inspection requirements are in no way relaxed by the Office of Price Administration's recent order freeing tire recapping with passenger type camberback from rationing restrictions, E. A. Siferd chairman of the local War Price and Rationing Board, said Saturday.

The OPA official made this statement to correct a mistaken belief apparently held by some motorists.

"It is true that a car owner can get his tires recapped with reclaimed rubber without first getting the recommendation of an official OPA inspector, Siferd said, 'but the periodic inspection program to preserve tires remains in effect. Motorists who do not get the inspections made and recorded on their Tire Inspection Records will not be eligible for renewal of gasoline rations or for purchase of tires in the future.'"

GROCERS ASKED TO OBTAIN OPA POINT TABLES

Retail and wholesale grocers were asked Saturday by the Office of Price Administration to get official OPA Tables of Point Values, used in the point system of rationing processed foods, from local postoffices.

A sample poll taken by OPA field representatives indicates that large numbers of grocers in many sections of the country have not yet obtained the official postcards, although those questioned said they had clipped the point value lists which were widely published in the nation's newspapers.

The newspaper reproductions effectively serve the purpose of presenting the point values themselves, but with rare exceptions, do not contain the list of instructions to retailers printed on the back of the official placard.

TEACHER ENLISTS

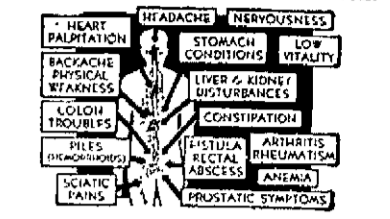
