LOCAL WOMAN TOLD BROTHER HURT IN AFRICA

Another Lima area youth, Sergt. Richard D. Latham of Rawson, has been wounded while fighting the Axis in the North African war theatre.

This information was received Thursday by the youth's sister, Mrs. J. McLean Reed, 819 College-av. wife of the superintendent of Lima Public schools.

The war department informed Mrs. Reed that her brother was wounded on Feb. 22. Extent of his injuries was not learned. She also reports that she has learned that he is in a British hospital in Africa.

Sergt. Latham, who formerly operated a service station and tourist headquarters on Route 25 north of Lima, entered the service about two years ago and he went overseas last November. While in this country he served at Fort Bragg, N. C.

He has two other brothers in the service. Pat, Robert, Latham, of Denver, Colo., and Sgt. L. D. Latham, an instructor at Fort Sill, Okla. His mother, Mrs. Augusta Latham, resides in Rawson.

More Than 1,000 Books Gathered By Junior Red Cross Given Servicemen

Departmentals for the fifth estimate have been scheduled as follows: Home economics, industrial arts, and natural science—Tuesday, March 30; math—Wednesday, March 31; English—Thursday, April 1; foreign languages—Monday, April 5; social science—Tuesday, April 6; commercial—Wednesday, April 7.

Mysteries, comic books, fictions, biographies, nature books, and joke books were contributed by Central students to the Victory Book campaign which was sponsored by the Junior Red Cross. The number of books donated was as follows: 40 pocket editions, 200 comics, and a few over 400 other books. This makes a total of a little over 1,000 volumes. These books will be sent to camps all over the country for our men in service.

The Junior Red Cross council also is sponsoring other projects that have to do with the war effort. The home economics department is making the following articles for soldiers hospitals: 30 cushion covers for convalescents, 10 bed jackets, five lap robes for wheel chair patients, and 10 stumps and stoop stringers for hot compress bandages.

The industrial arts department is donating card holders, checker boards and checkers, and ash trays. The art classes are making book marks, writing portfolios and cross word puzzles. The costs for these projects will come from the Junior Red Cross council funds which are raised by the annual roll call, the sale of pencils and other activities.

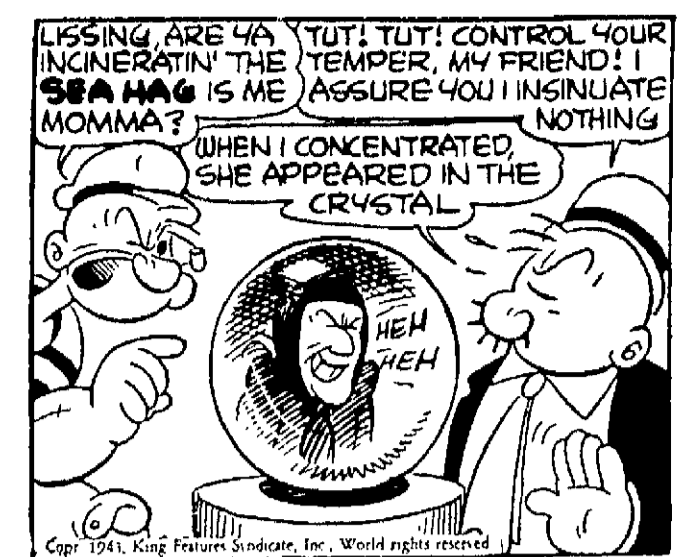

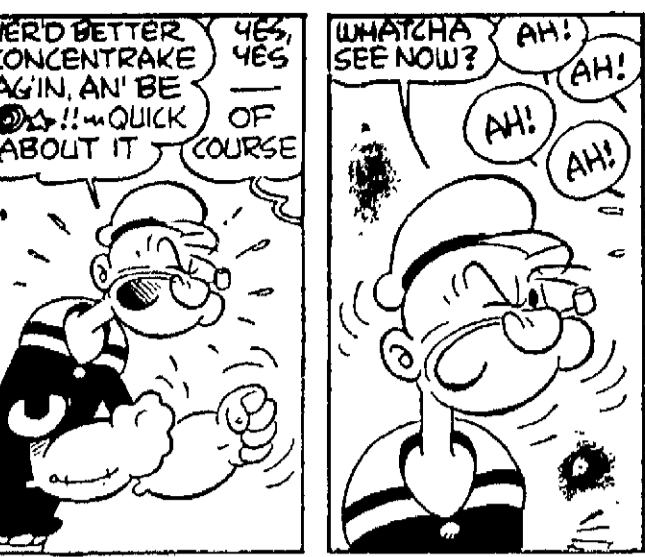
