Freight Report **Wants Rates** to Be Uniform

WASHINGTON - (U.P) - The board of transportation investigation and research created by congress in 1940 submitted to Pres. Roosevelt and congress Tuesday a program recommending legislative action to establish uniform freight rates throughout the coun-

try.
The Tennessee Valley Authority made a similar recommendation last week.

The plan, designed to eliminate regional differentials long protested by the south and west as discriminatory, provides that the interstate commerce act be amended to give authority and power of enforcement to the Interstate Commerce Commission to set up uniform classification and rate scales. 




