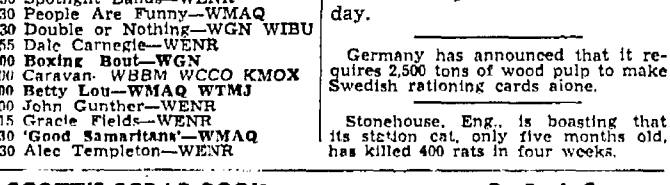
### Relief Diet Good, Wealthy Pair Says

## Uncle Ray's Corner

HANNIBAL WON MANY BATTLES BUT LOST THE LAST ONE

WHILE he was in Italy, Hannibal fought many battles, and one of them is known as the "Battle of Cannae." It was named after Cannae, an ancient town in southern Italy near which it was fought.

There is some difference of opinion as to the exact numbers on the two sides, but all accounts agree that Hannibal had fewer soldiers. His total force was probably about 48,000 men. Against him were about 85,000 Romans.

Hannibal, however, had a cavalry force almost twice that of the Romans—about 10,000 mounted men against 6,000. Before the battle was very old, the Roman cavalry was put to flight, and then Hannibal closed a trap on the infantry. By the close of the fighting that day, almost all the Roman foot soldiers were dead.

After his many victories, it seems strange that Hannibal did not attack and capture Rome. At one time he moved close to the capital of the Roman empire, but failed to place it under siege.

The chief excuse given is that Hannibal was without machines of war of the type then used to capture walled cities. Another reason offered is that Hannibal's army was too small to surround such a large city.

In any case the failure to capture Rome meant the failure of Hannibal's long campaign. He spent 15 years in Italy, and his army was slowly worn down. A few thousand fresh soldiers reached him from Carthage, but he was given little other help from home. For the most part, he and his soldiers had to "live from the country." His brother, Hasdrubal, tried to bring in a new army from Spain but was defeated on the way and lost his life.

Toward the end of Hannibal's warfare in Italy, a young Roman general started to turn the tables on Carthage. He was named Scipio, and he led an army of invasion into the part of Africa now known as Tunisia.

Fearing that their capital city would be captured, the leaders at Carthage sent orders to Hannibal to come home. With great skill he placed his troops aboard sailing vessels, and crossed the Mediterranean to Carthage.

After his return, Hannibal led an army against Scipio, but this time he was defeated. It was the only important battle he lost in his long career, but it was a most serious defeat. Carthage lost the war and was forced to pay tribute to Rome.

Hannibal fled to the eastern end of the Mediterranean sea, and was given protection by a king. He died at the age of 64.
