## Raising Bees Will Help Bring Victory, 78-Year-Young Enthusiast Declares

Bees for victory... that's what L. W. Parman, 124 S. Mills st., suggests, and bees are part of his contribution to the war effort.

But right now the 78-year-old veteran beekeeper is spending most of his time at another of his victory jobs, working as a Western Union messenger.

"I've been helping out down there since Dec. 17 when they said they were looking for young men over 50," the dignified-looking old gentleman said with a twinkle in his eye.

**Has Kept Bees 60 Years**  
Beekeeping is his true love, however, and he has been at that almost 60 years, although it amazes him to think he really has been at it so long.

"I used to think the book entitled '50 Years Among the Bees' was wonderful," he mused.

At present Parman has 14 colonies of honey-gatherers, but at one time he had 80 colonies. "They used to call me the crazy bee-man in Dane county," he chuckled.

Beekeeping is more than a hobby with Parman, it's real business, and right now it's more than that, it's for victory.

**Honey, Beeswax Important**  
"The government is urging greater production of both honey and beeswax this year," he explained. Both are needed for the war effort, honey to replace some of the rationed sugar, and beeswax in production work.

The government wants more honey and beeswax producers, too, and Parman offers some suggestions for those interested in starting beekeeping.

The best way to start a colony, he said, is to get a package of bees, including a queen, from the south. It is easier to get bees from the southern states because northerners have more difficulty starting their colonies and don't like to part with them when they are well started, he explained.

After the package of bees is obtained, there are only three essentials besides hard work — a hive, a bee-smoker, and a bee-veil, the last two very necessary for beginners, the veteran warned.

**Smoke Aids Honey Supply**  
"The smoker makes the bees fill up with honey and when they're full, just like humans, they are gentler," he said. The veil is for the beekeeper's protection.

Parman himself handles such supplies and other essentials for beekeepers. He has kept bee supplies since he moved to Madison in 1907.

But he had "bees in his bonnet" long before he came to Madison, for he first became fascinated with them in 1884 while working for a man who had several colonies. His employer used Quincy's book on bees as a guide, and Parman used to read the book nights after his employer had gone to bed.

Soon he had his own bees, he accumulated more and more until, at one time, he had 80 colonies.

**Gardener, Too**  
But bees haven't been his sole occupation, Parman is a gardener, too.

He was born on a farm in Black Earth, and confesses that he has always liked farming as well as finding the farm the best place to keep bees. When he moved to Madison in 1907, it was to a farm adjoining Nakoma, on what is known as the Piper road.

His farm there was originally 52 acres, but most of it since has been sold, becoming part of the Parman addition to Nakoma, until there are only about 14 acres.

left, part in the city, and part in the town of Madison. He also owns a home on Parker dr.

The versatile bee-man doesn't do his victory gardening on his land, however. Most of it he rents to other gardeners. Last year he himself cared for about an acre of garden plots in various spots in the city. He expects to garden again this year, but has no plans completed as yet.

"But I'm a garden lover," he chuckled, "I love to hang on the end of a hoe!"

**Bees Will Sting**  
He loves his bees more, though, but he frowns at the idea that they won't sting if they are "just left alone."

"Tut, tut, no!" he said. "I've kept bees long enough to know better than that!"

He advocates proper clothing when working with bees. "I don't like to see girls in pants-slacks,

I guess you call them," he laughed, "but if a woman is going to keep bees, she'd better wear them!"

Close-fitting clothes are necessary, and the aforementioned veil, as well, Parman warned. "It's a good idea to pull up your socks over your trouser-cuffs, too," he said. "Bees are apt to crawl up under the clothing otherwise."

There are certain times when it is easier to work with bees he said. They should be left alone in wet weather, when they can't work, and at any time they are stirred up. When they are busy and nectar is plentiful, is the best time to work with them, Parman said.

The victory-gardening, beekeeping messenger "boy" who reached his 78th birthday anniversary last Oct. 3, is a constant reader of The State Journal, having subscribed to it ever since he moved here in 1907.
