COLUMBUS, O., April 10 -(INS) - A new federal patronage set-up, which will distribute several hundred federal jobs in Ohio between the latter part of April and the end of the year, will be handled by the Democratic state executive committee, Chairman Darrell Jones, of Newark, confirmed today.
