Uncle Ray's Corner

AMONG the deer of India, the most common is the sambar. This large and beautiful animal has dark brown hair.

A full-grown sambar may be as much as four and a half feet high at the shoulders. The antlers sometimes reach a length of four feet.

A fine example of the sambar family, with its head raised, may have a total height of nine feet, from the ground to the tips of the antlers.

Each antler of an adult stag has three points. The number of points does not keep on increasing as the years go by, as is the case with most kinds of deer. Only in a very few cases have sambar antlers with more than three points been found.

Forests and wooded hills are the homes of sambar deer. They are shy animals, and spend most of their daylight hours resting in deep shade. At night they browse on grass and whatever other plant food they may find.

The hill districts of India have sambar deer, and they also graze on the lower slopes of the Himalaya mountains. Sometimes they are found at points a mile and a half above sea level.

In past times the sambar was hunted with packs of dogs. When the animal was brought to bay, the hunter would strike it down with a spear, instead of shooting it.

Sir Samuel Baker tells of a hunt of that kind which came to a strange end. He says that his hounds drove a stag to a large rock at the edge of a high, steep cliff. The stag lowered his head

more animals, and frighten them until they run within range of the hunter's rifle. Now and then a stag escapes this fate by turning back and running right through the line of beaters.

We have no sambar deer in the forests of this continent, but some museums have groups of them on display. The Field Museum in Chicago has a lifelike group made up of a stag, a doe and a fawn at a salt-lick.
