

WAVE AND SPAR DRIVE PLANNED

Women's Organizations Will Map Program To Win Recruits

A meeting of representatives of all women's organizations in Lima along with PTA groups will be held Wednesday at 8 p. m. at the Argonne hotel in the interest of the WAVE and SPAR recruiting drive.

The meeting, called by the Volunteer Recruiting committee under the chairmanship of Mrs. Edward Meeks, will outline ways and means of aiding the drive to enlist women age 20 to 36 in the U. S. Navy.

"It is thru military necessity that the navy is urging women to join the WAVE and SPARS," Mrs. Meeks stated in a letter to the groups, "and we feel that an important contribution can be made by the women's organizations of this city in furthering the war effort."

Included in the program will be addresses by Dr. Cornelius Nicholas Bakker, pastor of the Market Street Presbyterian church; Miss Elsie B. Heller, executive secretary of the Y. W. C. A.; Chief Petty Officer J. B. Sanzenbacher, of Toledo, in charge of WAVE enlistment for northern Ohio and Calhoun Cartwright, local navy recruiting officer.

Navy movies will be shown. The meeting is open to the public and all organizations were urged to send delegates.

Food Ration Applications Due By May 5

Institutional and industrial users of foods are due at the Allen-co Ration Board headquarters in the old Postoffice-building between now and May 5 to make their next application for ration points.

The quota of points to be obtained at this time covers purchases of coffee, sugar, processed foods, meats, shortenings and cheese. Previously, applications for these food points were made at different dates, but now that the system has been established, one application will serve for all rationed foods.

Beside the accommodation of having to make only one application for ration points, the points to be granted now will cover a two months' allotment. In this way, all institutions and industries may receive their food points for the months of May and June at one time.

In case new restaurants or others who belong in the institutional and industrial class, have not yet registered at the Ration Board, their managers should do so at once. Harry Fox, chief clerk, called attention to the fact that new registrants are required to bring with them when they make application at board headquarters. (1) inventory of the processed foods on hand February 28, (2) inventory of all meats, fats and cheese on hand March 28th, (3) a record of the number of persons served in the month of last December, and (4) a record of the gross dollar revenue in last December.

OFFICE HOURS REVISED BY RATION BOARD

Change in the schedule of public hours at headquarters of the Allen-co War Price and Rationing Board was announced Saturday by Harry Fox, the board's chief clerk.

Beginning this week, headquarters, in the old Postoffice-building, Elizabeth and High-sts., will be open every Friday evening until 9 o'clock. The office will be closed to the public on Wednesday afternoons when clerks will use this period for uninterrupted clerical work.

The change, Fox said, is being made to accommodate persons who are at work during the day and unable to call at the office.

The new daily schedule of hours follows: Monday, 9 a. m. to 4:30 p. m.; Tuesday, 9 a. m. to 4:30 p. m.; Wednesday, 9 a. m. to 12 noon; Thursday, 9 a. m. to 4:30 p. m.; Friday, 9 a. m. to 9 p. m., and Saturday, 9 a. m. to 12:15 noon.

The Y. W. C. A. announces an extended service for girls and women of Lima thru its newly organized Personal Service Committee.

With Mrs. Fred Short as its chairman, this committee will concern itself with expanding the rooms registry which was initiated by the Newcomers club (formerly the Married Women's club) and in addition to this it will establish an emergency housing service. This latter takes the form of a list of hostesses who have agreed to care for women in their homes for a limited period until the committee can find suitable rooms for them. These hostesses have been recruited from board, committee and club members of the Y. W. C. A. and additional volunteers will be welcomed. Another responsibility of Personal Service committee will be that of counseling with girls on personal problems, helping them contact community resources, establish church and social connections and find friends thru the Y. W. C. A. and other groups in Lima. The committee has placed in the railway and bus terminals attractive and permanent posters which state the services offered, give the hours the Y. W. C. A. office is open and give telephone numbers of volunteers for making contacts after office hours. This service has been established because of the need which is rapidly increasing as larger numbers of women come to Lima to work in business and industry and it is consistent with the policy of the Y. W. C. A. to adjust and expand its work to the emerging needs of girls and women.
