Food Poisoning Threat Cited

Madison housewives are urged by insurance statisticians to be more than ever on guard against contaminated food.

Statisticians Warn of Contamination

The statisticians declare that even in times of plentiful food supplies the number of deaths from food poisoning is far from insignificant, and the number of persons made seriously ill by partaking of contaminated food runs to many thousands annually.

ONE—Cans with bulging ends, TWO—Glass containers showing seepage over the tops.

THREE—Food discoloration.

As canned goods may be kept in the home for longer periods now than has been the custom in other years, the statisticians explain that it is then doubly necessary to make sure that the cans has not become damaged, allowing entry to disease-producing bacteria.

"Suspected foods should never be tasted to discover 'spoilage,' since even small amounts of some bacterially infested foods can cause illness or death."

The statisticians remind home food-canners that "canned foods must be thoroughly sterilized to safeguard against botulism, a highly fatal type of food poisoning. Most cases of the kind that have occurred involved vegetables; but fruit, meat, and fish were also at times incriminated. Fatal poisoning from commercially canned goods, however, is actually rare."

Warning also is given against buying illegally prepared or distributed meats, because it is highly unhygienic and encourages a criminal class. "A disregard of the usual sanitary measures goes hand in hand with the sale of such products." Other advice about the purchase and preparation of meats follows:
