Easter Parade Will Be Given Musical Preview In Morton Downey Program Featuring Irving Berlin's Ballads

Kate Smith and her traveling troupe will perform a "broadcast double" by presenting their variety hour from two service camps in one night, Friday, over WABC. The early broadcast at 8 p. m. (EWT) for the east and middle west, will be presented at Camp Haan, U. S. Army Base near Riverside, Calif. The entire company then will move to March field, U. S. Air Base, a mile away, and do the repeat broadcast for the West Coast at 9 p. m. (EWT).

The Easter parade will be given a musical preview over WJZ on Friday when Morton Downey will feature the beloved Irving Berlin ballad on his "Songs by Morton Downey" program at 3 p. m. EWT. Downey will also offer "The Song Is You" and, as his hymn of the week, "The Old Rugged Cross."

FIVE GERMAN ALIENS SEIZED

CHICAGO, April 23.—(INS)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation announced today the arrest of five more German aliens two of them employed in war plants as dangerous to the nation's security.

One of the war plant workers who was getting \$100 a week, was quoted by Spencer J. Dayton, agent in charge of the Chicago FBI office as saying he wouldn't buy war bonds to aid in the war against Hitler. The other war plant worker said the Nazis were certain to win and that his great desire was to return to Germany—after the war.


