Frances (Bud) Carey featured Friday night's session of the Madison Women's Bowling Assn. city tournament at the Madison Alloys as she fired a 544 series to take over the lead of the Class B singles.

Mrs. Carey displaced Mildred Vick as the Class B singles leader as she blasted out games of 180, 192 and 172 for her 544 series, the highest singles triple of the tourney. Mrs. Vick dropped to second place with 536, and Esther Werblow took third place with 528.

Four other changes took place in the minor events standings Friday night. Myrtle Loftsgordon and Harriet Roland moved into second place in the Class B doubles with a 999 aggregate on respective series of 512 and 487. Esther Werblow and Mearl Lewis took sixth with 957, and Hazel Lanz and Betty Lanz took over eighth place with a 933 total.

NEW YORK (U.P.)—Manager Ossie Bluege of the Washington Senators modestly confined his 1943 pre-season forecast to the prediction that he might field an aggressive team. But the Senators today have exceeded that conservative estimate to the extent that they look like a hot bet for the first division in the American League.

The Senators has won six of nine games thus far and are just a deep breath away driver's seat. This fine showing—responsible for their present ranking was the circuit's best drawing card—can be attributed to several factors.

Washington pitching has experienced an amazing pickup, the outfield looks like it might develop into the best in the league, and the infield—unless it is hit by the draft—might be as formidable as any in the league.

Fine Pitching

At the moment, Bluege appears to have a fine mound staff. Whether it will continue to perform as efficiently when the current baseball gives way to the livelier pellet remains to be seen. Alex Carrasquel, the Venezuelan, has authored two triumphs—both of them a two-hit shutout. Southpaw Ewald Pyle, relegated to Toledo last year by the Browns, seems like a hot find. He made his debut with a four-hitter against the Yankees, bowing to Spud Chandler's one-hit masterpiece, and then came through with a six-hit whitewash of the A's.

Dutch Leonard, who was out most of last season with a broken ankle, has come through in elegant style, turning in twin triumphs, his latest a twin powered, 10-inning job against the Yankees Friday.

At third, Ellis Clary is setting the hitting pace, batting well the .300 mark as Johnny Sullivan keeps improving at shortstop. Jimmy Vernon looks all right on first and Gerry Priddy may fill the bill at second. But both may be drafted.

Case's Speed Valuable

Stan Spence, George Case and Bob Johnson look like an outfield that may become the best in the business. Spence was the surprise of the league last year, hitting .323 and leading in triples with 15. John's slugging ability is well-known and Case is valuable.

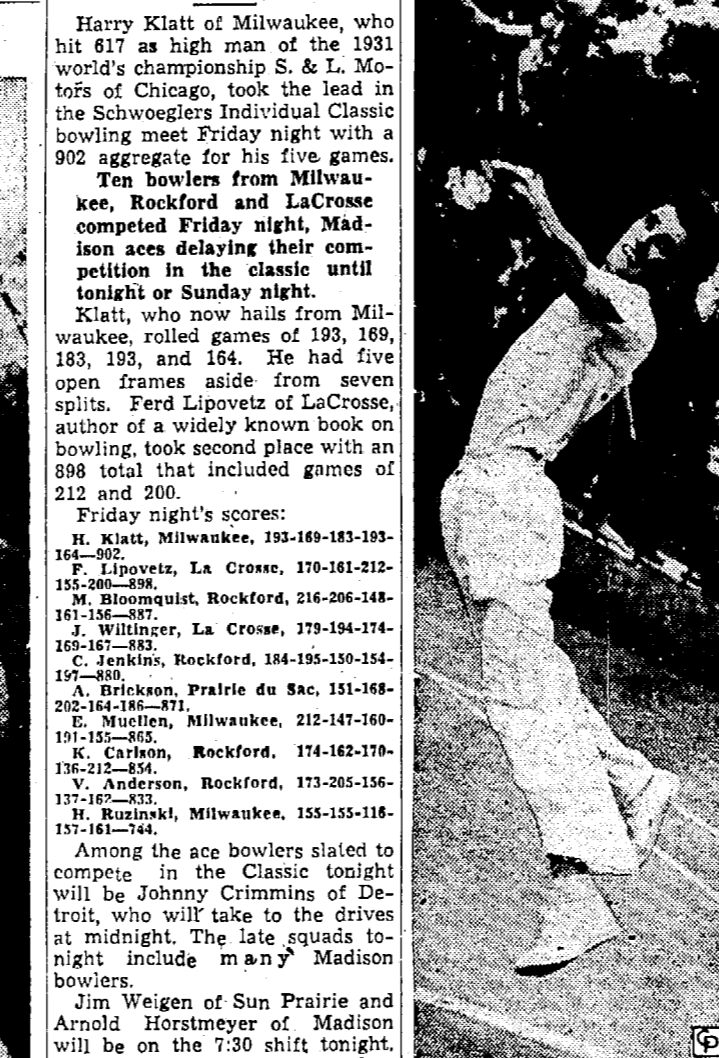
Five State Nines Play Great Lakes

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—Henry Armstrong, former triple champion, was another stride along the long comeback trail to a rematch with lightweight champion Beau Jack today after registering a technical knockout over tough Savorio Turiello of New York.

Armstrong kayoted Turiello just before the bell sounded to end the fifth round of a scheduled 10-rounder Friday night. He opened fire with a withering body attack in the third and dropped the New Yorker for a seven count in the fourth.

Turiello compensated with gameness for what he lacked in skill. He hit the canvas three times in the fourth and fifth, but refused to give up until Referee Eddie Josephs called a halt after 1:44 of the fifth.

Armstrong looked like the "perpetual motion" champion of old, alternately skipping around, rushing Turiello, evading a punch and then landing solidly. It was the second victory for Armstrong over the New Yorker. He kayoted him last December on the coast.
