RATIONING OF CLOTHES SEEN BOOST TO LABOR

NEW YORK, May 8—(INS)—Rationing of wearing apparel in the United States would release more than 1,000,000 workers for war industries, Francis Flood, assistant war food administrator, maintained today.

Flood said clothes rationing in Britain had released 400,000 workers to more essential industries. He estimated that this country, with three times the population of Great Britain, would be able to divert more than 1,000,000 workers to war work from the clothing industry.
