## MILLION CIGARETS FOR ALLEN-CO BOYS ABROAD IS GOAL SET BY LEGION

"A million cigarettes for Allen-co armed forces serving overseas." This slogan has been adopted by William Gallagher post, American Legion, as the Legion launched its campaign Sunday to raise funds to purchase the cigarettes for men in the Army, Marines, Navy and Coast Guard.

Assisted by members of the Legion auxiliary, the post, commanded by Carl H. McMillen, has announced a campaign committee composed of Orrin Welty, chairman in charge of sales, assisted by Tom Gallagher; Dean Patton, adjutant and treasurer; Joe Gooding, publicity chairman, assisted by W. H. Hagen, Frank Callahan and F. S. Ammon.

In launching the drive for cigarettes, Commander McMillen stated that arrangements have been completed with cigarette manufacturers for purchase of a package of 20 cigarettes for five cents. The manufacturer will turn the cigarettes over to a special Service officer and the War Department will supervise the distribution to Allen-co service men on duty outside the United States.

"This is the first campaign of this nature in this section of Ohio and we believe it will go over the top before the close of the month," McMillen stated. "A recent survey in the Army revealed that eight out of every ten persons polled placed cigarettes as the top gift. General MacArthur recently stated that American cigarettes, of all personal comforts, are the most difficult to obtain."

McMillen indicated that pledges of support had been given by several manufacturers and business establishments previous to the opening of the drive and with added support from civic clubs, fraternal organizations and individuals the Legion expects to exceed the million cigarette goal.
