

MINNEAPOLIS— (U.R) —Army officials are testing a huge two motored transport glider, built al-most entirely of non-essential tions coincided most nearly with materials, that is expected to ex-

pand the use of gliders in warfare. The nation's first trial flight of this type of aircraft was made Wednesday at Wold Chamberlain airport where the troop-carrying gliders are being assembled on a

The glider, which in Thursday's flights carried a full complement of 15 equipped troops, was likened to the women's auxiliaries of the armed forces. It would release 'war planes, used for towing purposes, to the fight-

Moreover the self-powered gliders obviate the need of crating and shipping the craft. Less expersive than troop transports and constructed mostly of wood, the gliders could be used for short hops either domestically or abroad, Dent said. Their gliding range is far greater than that of

Parker said the gliders are best suited for transporting men or supplies from base to base. The Mrs. Edna Hasz, Route 3 and Ann gliders, previously powerless, are equipped with a small motor slung under each wing. Fitted with small hardwood propellors, the motors are removable.


