Tuesday and Wednesday will be the final days for the showing of "Keeper of the Flame," at the State. Starring Spencer Tracy and Katharine Hepburn, it deals with a reporter's attempt to solve the mysteries surrounding the death of a prominent man. "Hi, Buddy," packed with music and dealing with efforts to keep open a club for boys and girls, completes the program.

Something different in jungle warfare came about when he witnessed the unique killing of an Anaconda snake by a pair Jabiru storks who obviously resented the snake venturing into their preserve. He himself was attacked by a twenty-foot Anaconda and in the very throes of death when rescued by Mike Rojinsky and the camp natives.

"Wild Horse Rustlers" starring Bob Livingston as The Lone Rider also plays at the Sigma Wednesday.

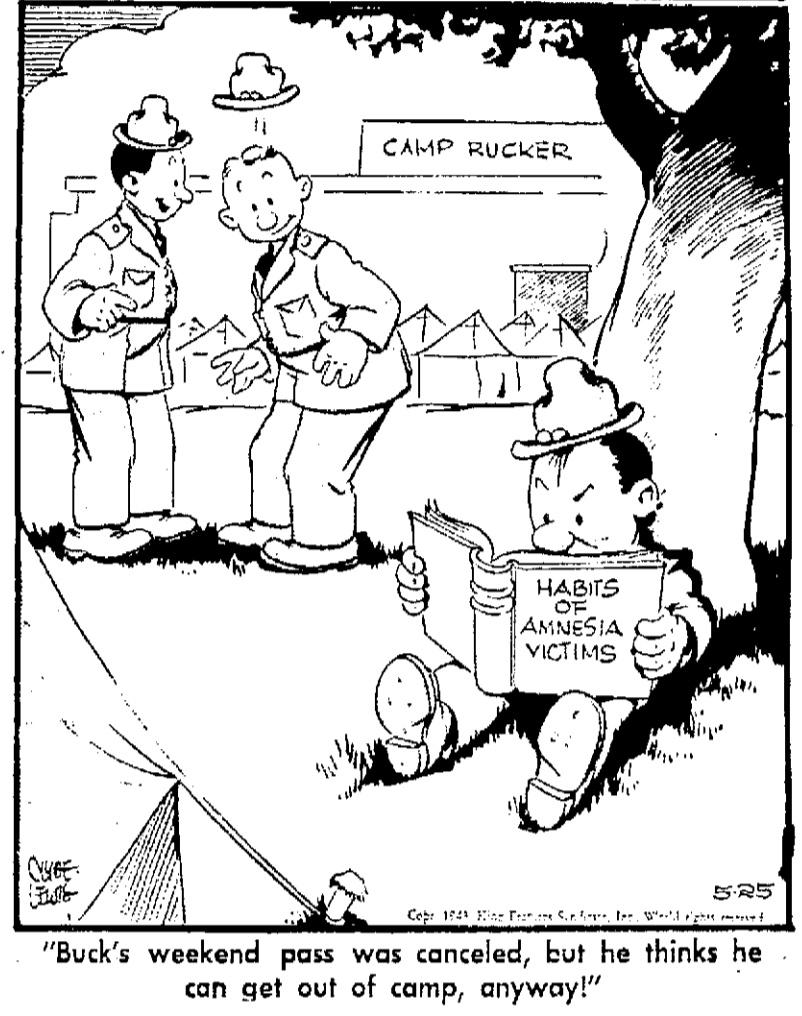
