

# Higher Loan Rate May Boost Bread Prices

## Subsidy For Millers Also Is Suggested

CHICAGO, June 12—(AP)—Grain men speculated today that it might be necessary to subsidize millers or permit an increase of a cent a loaf in the price of bread as the result of a government loan on the 1943 wheat crop eight cents a bushel higher than the rate in effect for the 1942 crop.

The government loan rate, averaging \$1.22 a bushel on the farm, was announced last Thursday. In some cases, it was said, the loan was higher than the indirect ceiling which has existed on wheat since maximums were placed over flour late last year.

While there is no actual ceiling on wheat, a "reflected" ceiling is present because millers must sell flour under maximums. Thus, if they are to make a profit on their grinding operations, they cannot afford to buy wheat above a specific price.

Flour maximums were set on the basis of a wheat price of 89 per cent of parity, while the loan rate is only 85 per cent of parity. (Parity is a formula designed to give producers of farm products the same purchasing power they enjoyed in a favorable past period, usually -000-14.)

The rub in this situation is that parity has risen steadily since last year, when the flour ceiling was set, with the result that 85 per cent of parity today is as high or higher, than an 89 per cent of parity price several months ago.

The loan price serves as a floor — producers will not sell wheat at a price under the loan, considering storage charges. Thus, millers in some territories are believed to be caught in a squeeze between present wheat prices, supported by the loan rate, and flour ceilings.

Traders asserted the extent of this squeeze would be known over the next several weeks, and if millers are unable to operate profitably, they probably will protest to Washington. Then the question of subsidizing or advancing the bread price is likely to come to the front, grain men said.

Oats and rye spurred to new seasonal peaks this week, while wheat lagged. The bread cereal closed 1/4¢ higher Friday than last Saturday, July \$1.45 1/4¢, corn was unchanged, July \$1.05, oats advanced 2 1/4¢ cents and rye was up 2 1/2¢ cents.

## LARGE ACREAGE OF CORN SEEN IN MARSHLANDS

ADA, O., June 12 — (UP) — The Scioto marsh farmers are planting the largest acreage of corn in the history in the black muck lands, it was reported today.

Many acres of early corn and potatoes in the marsh lands have been replanted and 75 per cent of the corn crop already has been planted.

Rotted seed also caused many potato growers to make a second planting. The Scioto Land Co. reported a 20 per cent loss from rotted seed.

NEW YORK, June 12—(AP)—Lower tendencies ruled in the stock market today and the week was one of generally falling prices.

While offerings never were pressing, and scattered recoveries were in evidence at the close, fractional declines were well in the majority. A partial offset to the retreat was that dealings were among the slowest of the year to date.

Potential buyers seemed to be in a waiting mood. The inclination was to keep accounts more or less liquid pending the all-out European invasion push, clarification of the tax program and settlement of various labor controversies.

On the offside today were Chrysler, Goodrich, U. S. Rubber, Montgomery Ward, Douglas Aircraft, Anaconda, Allied Chemical and Eastman Kodak. U. S. Steel and Bethlehem came back at the last and finished unchanged. Modest improvement was registered by Sears Roebuck, International Harvester, Deere, American Telephone, Du Pont and J. C. Penney.

Grains were steady to higher. Hogs were about even. Cotton was unchanged to 10 cents a bale lower.

Among minor losers in an apathetic curb were American Cyanamid "B", Cuban Atlantic Sugar and Lehigh Coal. Up a shade were United Light & Power Preferred and Brazilian Tractor.

Reports from New York said large eastern chain and independent bakeries in the market for approximately 500,000 sacks, weighing 100 pounds each, of all types of flour. These same interests took more than 100,000 sacks of similar weight yesterday.
