Uncle Ray's Corner

THERE is a plant known as "bee-swarm orchid," and the name might make a person suppose that bees swarm over it. The fact is that the name came from markings on the flowers, not from the visits of bees.

Bee-swarm orchids grow in Mexico, also in other parts of Latin America. In Brazil they are found on high hills near Rio de Janeiro, as much as three-thirtieths of a mile above sea level.

Instead of growing in soil, the bee-swarm orchid finds a resting place on a solid object. It may be fastened to a bare rock, or it may lodge on the trunk of a tree.

When one plant rests on another, it usually is classed as a "parasite." A plant like the mistletoe takes its food from trees, and is truly a parasite.

The bee-swarm orchid is not that kind of a parasite. All it asks is free lodging; it provides its own food.

The great majority of plants send their roots into the soil, but the bee-swarm orchid and some of its relatives can live with the roots exposed to the air.

Looking at a tall tree, a traveler in Latin America may see one of these plants clinging to the trunk at a point 20 or 30 feet high. The scores of roots are in plain view, making a mass about the size of a crow's nest.

Besides the roots there are long, narrow leaves and, at proper season, pretty yellow flowers. Sometimes the flowers have green in them, and the color may be described as "yellowish green."

The blossoms have spots on them, and these spots might be mistaken for bees. There we have
