





That list is based on figures published before the outbreak of the present war, and shows peacetime habits. War has changed the picture a great deal. Holland, for example, would be out of the list today, since the Dutch cannot import tea from the Orient, where most of it grows.

The average for the United States before the statt of the present war was about three-fourths of a pound per person.

South America has a kind of tea known as "mate" or "Paraguay tea." It is most widely grown and used in Paraguay, but a great deal of it is raised in Brazil. Since the outbreak of the present war. a large amount of Paraguay tea has found its way into the markets
