Chicago Scores Four in Seventh

Senators Cut Yanks' Lead to Three Games

Thanks to the artistic ineptitude of the Brooklyn Dodgers, the St. Louis Cardinals still were three games in front in the National League today.

The Cardinals blew sky-high in the seventh inning with the score at 1-1 and the Chicago Cubs scored four times on no hits to breeze to a 6-1 victory. Johnny Hopp made two errors while Marty Marion and Walker Cooper each contributed one to present the Cubs with their gift runs. Claude Passeau won his fourth game while Max Lanier was suffering his fourth defeat.

Phils Tally 9 in 6th

The roof fell in on the Dodgers when the Philadelphia Phillies staged a nine-run outburst in the sixth inning that erased the Dodgers' eight-run advantage and gave the Phillies a 10-8 victory. Jimmy Wasdell scored from second base on Babe Dahlgren's second single of the inning with what proved to be the winning run.

The Cincinnati Reds blanked the Pittsburgh Pirates, 1-0, in a 14-inning affair in which Ray Starr went the whole distance for the Reds and allowed a total of only five hits. Gerald Walker's single scoring Lonnie Frey from third base after the latter's right field triple was the deciding factor.

Chester Ross' three-run pinch homer with two gone in the ninth inning lifted the Boston Braves into an 8-6 decision over the New York Giants. Every Giant run was unearned.

Hughson Stops Yanks

In the American League, the Washington Senators sliced the New York Yankees' lead to three games by taking the measure of the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-2, in an 11-inning night game. Milo Candini won his sixth straight game when Bob Johnson singled Mickey Vernon home and then scored the second run on Jake Early's drive.

The Yankees were almost completely throttled by Tex Hughson's four-hitter as the Boston Red Sox won their second of nine games with a score of 3-1. Deep in a slump both afield and at bat, Joe Gordon made two costly errors that were instrumental in the Red Sox triumph.

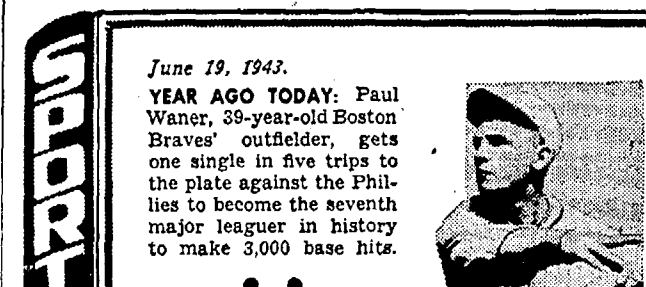
Vern Stephens, the league's leading hitter, slammed two home runs and a double to lead the St. Louis Browns to a 7-4 win over the Detroit Tigers. Johnny Niggeling, Brownie Knuckle-baller, was credited with the victory although he was chased in the last inning by a Tiger rally that netted three runs.

In Chicago the Cleveland Indians and the White Sox battled for three hours and 25 minutes under the lights before the visitors took the nod in the 14th inning early Saturday morning. The Indians pushed across two runs in the final frame to carry off the contest, 5-3. Successive singles by Oris Hackett, Manager Lou Boudreau and Rookie Pat Seery sealed the fate of the Sox.

Veteran Vernon Kennedy, pitching the last six innings after Al Smith and Marv Center were lifted for pinch hitters, was the winning pitcher.

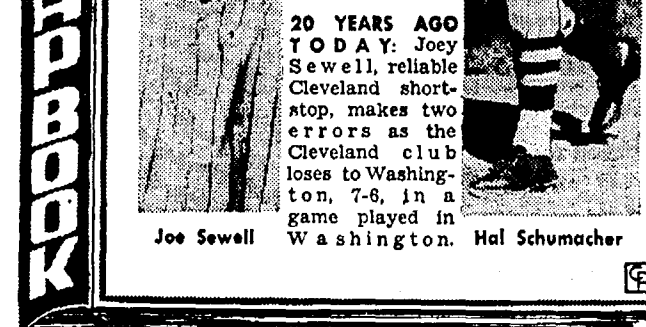

Brewers Win Mound Duel from Millers

Milwaukee took a tighter hold on second place in the American Association Friday night, and at the same time clipped a full game from the lead of Indianapolis by downing Minneapolis in a 1-0 thriller.

Minneapolis and Milwaukee were tied for second when the Millers arrived at Milwaukee Thursday, but by losing the first two games of the series they now are two games out of second, and only one game ahead of Columbus, in fourth place.

The Brewers' second consecutive shutout victory over Minneapolis came as Ted Norbert bounced a two bagger off the left field planks in the sixth inning to score Shortstop Tony York. Earl Caldwell limited the Millers to five hits, while Loren Bain was almost as effective in holding the Brewers to six.

Bill Cox of Toledo held the league-leading Indianapolis Indians to seven hits as the Hens won, 7-1. Elon Hogsett and Al Bronkhorst were combed for 15 hits by the winners. Nick Gregor homered for the Hens in the ninth with no one on.

Aided by a homer in the seventh, the St. Paul Saints defeated Kansas City, 4-1. Clay Smith kept nine hits well scattered.

Last-place Louisville downed the Columbus Red Birds twice, 6-1 and 4-1. Creel and Buchringer gave up only seven hits in the opener, but four errors by their teammates contributed to the Birds' downfall. Schupp of the winners allowed five hits. Mel Deutch turned in another five hitter in the nightcap, as the Colonels combed Wilks and Barrett for 10.

Jefferson Club Retriever Trial for July 25th

JEFFERSON — Members of the Jefferson Sportsmen's club will sponsor a regular monthly AKC sanctioned retriever trial at Jefferson July 25th. The meet will be held at the foot of the Racine street bridge over the Rock river. This trial will give points toward the Challenge trophies to be awarded annually by the W. A. F. T. C. club to the outstanding dogs competing in each stake.

Four stakes will be run in the following order: Amateur Trained and Handled; Open Derby; Amateur Handled Non-Winner (Open to all dogs handled by an Amateur); provided dog has never placed in licensed open all age or won first place in licensed non-winner trial; Open All-Aged. Entries close at midnight on July 21st.

Trophies will be given winner in each event with ribbons awarded to 1st four places in each stake. Entry fees are \$2 for the first three events and \$3 for the fourth. Ed Blank, Jefferson, is chairman of the event.

Dahlgren, Stephens Pace Hitters

NEW YORK — (UP) — Vern Stephens, St. Louis Browns' shortstop, again led both major leagues in hitting during the past week with an average of .350 for 38 games, official averages disclosed today.

Behind the American League leader came the National League's top man, Babe Dahlgren of the Phillies, with a mark of .347 for 48 games.

The New York Yankees continued to boast the best collective hitting with a team mark of .253 while the American League's best defensive club was the Chicago White Sox with a .979 percentage afield.

Brooklyn's Dodgers, with a .263 collective average, held the senior circuit team hitting lead by .002 per cent over the front-running St. Louis Cardinals. The Cincinnati Reds led on defense with .981.

Milo Candini of the Senators paced American League tossers with five victories against no defeats, while Orval Grove of the White Sox had a 3-0 record. Jess Flores of the A's led the circuit in victories with eight—against four defeats.

Murry Dickson of St. Louis and Johnny Allen of the Dodgers were tops in the National League with 3-0 records. Mort Cooper had the most victories, eight, against three setbacks.

Black Bass Season Opens Sunday

Some marksmen, not at all worried about the ammunition shortage, will begin their peculiar brand of target practice Sunday when the black bass season opens in most of the state.

These marksmen, including tyros and experts, will be shooting casting baits and fly rod lures into spots where they suppose largemouth or smallmouth bass will be waiting. The last of the major fishing seasons beginning in the state in 1943, the bass season perhaps attracts more devotees than any other opening, for these fish, especially the large mouth, are found everywhere in the state.

The late spring with its rain and cold, spells bad news for the bass family. The fact that their spawning time has been set back, with the result that these nest guarding fish in many places will still be in a quarelsome mood, means they can be taken with comparative ease. More bass guarding a nest are notorious belligerents, often striking viciously at anything they think threatens the nest.

Some Waters Closed

It is for this reason that in the bass season in Green lake and in the Door county waters is held back until July 1. These waters warm up so slowly that the fish are sometimes still found over-nests by July 1. That condition is indicated generally for the state this year. It is not a condition which entices state fisheries men, who prefer a normal spawning time, with bass well along with their household work when the season is opened. Not much can be done about it, inasmuch as so widespread a season must be dated far in advance, and over the years the situation even up, with bass through spawning most springs when the season opens.

No change was made in the law on bass for 1943. The daily bag limit is seven. All must be at least 10 inches long. The largemouth is by far the commoner of the two species. Smallmouth regarded as the prize among the two, are now largely confined to rivers in the state. Still, at one time, Lake Mendota at Madison held the world record for a smallmouth, nine pounds, and in the nineties the Oconomowoc lakes near Milwaukee were pronounced by Dr. James A. Henshall as the best bass lakes in the country. Henshall, who became head of the United States bureau of fisheries, is credited with elevating the bass from the status of a rough fish to its present eminence among the gamest of fish.

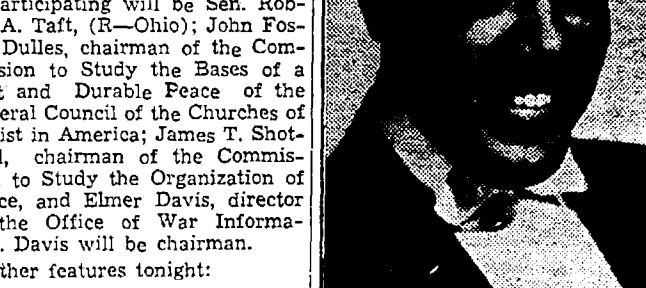

'99 and '00. This photograph was given me in the spring of 1900. He went on to play in 1901 on what was probably the greatest team Wisconsin had under the coaching of Phil King.

People generally believe that the great teams of the past were big men physically, but the fact is that compared with present-day standards they were small. Unquestionably the greatest team on which Al Larson played was the team of 1901. The heaviest man on the team was Arne Lerum, who weighed 185 pounds; the second heaviest was Emil Scow, who weighed 185. The fullback and one of the two halfbacks—Earl Driver, Eddie Coehms, and Al Larson—weighed from 165 to 170 pounds. What made Larson great was his football "savvy," because he was neither very big nor very fast. One of the teams that came to Madison to play in the fall of 1901 was the University of Kansas. I happened to be in the shower at the same time as the Kansas team after the game. One of the ends said, "I just couldn't figure that tow-headed halfback. He was coaching me all the time, but I couldn't stop him anyhow."

Al Larson was immensely popular, and deservedly so. He never tried to capitalize on his football background; he was modest, kindly, and had a great sense of humor, as his episode with the Kansas end will testify. Whether he was the greatest halfback that ever played here, no one can say; that's taking in a lot of territory. But he certainly was among 'em.
