Recalling that the recent conference as concerned with the problem of food and agriculture after the war, Lincoln warned that hungry people are dangerous people, and ill-fed bodies produce ill-ordered minds. The war may be lessened by months or years if we can hold out the promise of food to occupied countries," he continued. He did not side step the probability, either, that in the adjustment period it may be necessary for Americans to have less elaborate diets or "the kind of a diet that most of the rest of the world lives on."

Lincoln, one of the five official representatives of the United States at the food conference, is executive secretary of the Ohio Farm Bureau, Columbus. Grains Week's Trade On Firm Side

Market strength mainly reflected news from Washington where the Office of Price Administration and its ceiling policies were under heavy congressional attack. Traders thought the upshot of any legislative warfare against the price control agency might eventually result in 🏂 higher maximums.

A good deal of attention also was paid to news dispatches saying that Chester Davis, War Food Administrator, had told White House advisers that the food pro-1/2 duction program was in danger of collapse unless steps were taken to allow, among other is things, more flexibility in price control

The Washington news offset reports that wheat yields were exceeding expectations, that additional oats were on the way here from Canada and rye was not meeting demand from feeding interests that had been anticipated.
