# **WIBA Show To night Features World Security Discussion**

The subject, "Making the World Secure" will be discussed by three experts on the "For This We Fight" program, to be heard at 6 tonight over WIBA

Participants in the symposium which will take up the problems of an international police force and the post-war disarmament of the victorious and vanquished nations, will be Sen. Joseph Hurst Ball (R., Minn.); Clark M. Eichelberger, director of the Commission to Study the Organization of Peace; and Clyde Eagleton, professor of international law at New York university.

Sen. Ball is co-sponsor of the Ball-Burton-Hatch-Hill joint resolution for organization of the United Nations to insure justice and security in the postwar world, for an international police force, and for a method of relief and rehabilitation immediately following vic-

tory.

Eichelberger, who was with the AEF in the first World War and was decorated a Chevalier in the Legion of Honor, is a noted lecturer on international affairs. Prof. Eagleton has written widely on the law of nations and international government.


