Muriel Rahn, whose soprano voice and ingratiating personality are carrying her to the forefront of young concert artists, will sing a special concert tonight at 8 in the Wisconsin Union theater. Spirituals, operatic arias, and lieder will be included in the program. Actress as well as singer, Muriel Rahn was last seen in Madison in "The Pirate," last September, and played through the season in it on Broadway last year. Good seats for the performance may be obtained at the door tonight, according to Miss Mary Boyle, chairman of the "Summer Varieties" series.

Marjorie Lawrence's Spirit Spurs Her to Singing Success

Marjorie Lawrence, soprano of the Metropolitan Opera Co. who will sing here Monday night, July 12, is an example of the determination which overcomes apparently insurmountable obstacles.

Two years ago ,stricken with infantile paralysis, the Australian singer was told she might never appear again in concert or opera. Today, she has done both, with even greater success than attended her performances before her illness.

Her Will Triumphs Miss Lawrence went to Minneapolis to receive treatments from Sister Elizabeth Kenny, but even these would not have returned her to the stage without the working of her own will. She determined that she would sing again, and virtually forced herself first to regain her ability to play the piano and then to sing.

The success of her work was attested Jan. 22. when she sang the role of Venus in "Tannhauser" at her first public appearance since her illness. The audience gave her a three-minute ovation. Miss Lawrence, who once rode as a sheepherder on an Australian ranch and amused herself with such sports as boxing with kangaroos, inherited Kirsten Flagstad's Wagnerian roles at the "Met" when the Scandinavian soprano retired. Miss Lawrence went to the Metropolitan direct from the Paris Grand opera, where her debut was compared favorably with those of Chaliapin and Caruso. She soon created an unforgettable impression on American opera lovers with her realistic acting as Bruennhilde in the closing Ring performance, "Twilight of Gods."

Instead of meekly leading the horse to Siegfried's funeral pyre, as former prima donnas had done, Miss Lawrence thrilled her audience by mounting the horse and dashing into the flames, following Wagner's own stage instructions.

Dowagers in the swanky diamond horseshoe gasped, but Miss Lawrence performed the daring feat as a matter of

course. Born of pioneer stock on an Australian sheep ranch, she almost literally jumped from the cradle to the saddle. Joining her brothers in rounding up sheep on their father's vast ranch, she became expert at "breaking" wild

horses to the saddle. Marjorie's girlhood playthings were boomerangs rather than dolls, and her playmates were such oddities as the kangaroo, the cockatoo, the koala, and the laughing bird. Her childhood ambition was to be a jockey and it would have surprised no one, least of all her family, had she made her American debut as a rider

instead of a singer. Starts Singing at 5 Though Miss Lawrence started singing at the age of 5, she didn't take music seriously until she was 18. After only three years of study she was given, at the Paris opera, roles which traditionally had been reserved for experienced per-

formers only. Today, green-eyed, copperhaired Miss Lawrence contrast vividly with most of her singing sisters. Other vocalists were shocked to find she eats a hearty steak dinner an hour before curtain time, yet she is the most streamlined performer in the Wagnerian cast.
