# Reports About New Type Corn Borer Refuted

COLUMBUS, July 9 (UP)—Reports that a new type of corn worm has attacked corn in southwestern Ohio are without foundation, T. H. Parks, Ohio State university extension entomologist, said today.

Parks said farmers in the region apparently had failed to recognize the familiar corn borer which is taking its annual toll of Ohio corn.

Existence of a new threat to Ohio's corn crop was publicized after farmers reported discovery of a corn worm that ate the leaves of the plant as well as attacking the ear itself.

"Some people who aren't familiar with the corn borer don't realize that during its larval stage it eats its way across the leave on which it was hatched to the tassel of the young ear," Parks said.

"It's not at all unusual to find tiny holes stitched across the entire length of a leaf on a plant in which the borers are working," Parks said the infestation of corn borers was unusually severe this year because the damp spring furthered their growth, but he added that damage did not approach 1940 when the corn yield in some counties was cut 15 per cent by borers.

The damage has been limited, however, by the fact that there was very little early corn because farmers were unable to get in their crop because of the weather, he said. Late corn is not bothered by the borer which by that time has lived his seasonal cycle.

"Many farmers in the northwestern part of the state refuse to plant early corn at all," Parks said, "because they prefer to have

## Charles W. Beard, 82, Public Official In Putnam-co, Dies Thursday

He was a trustee of Greensburg-tp for 21 years, a member of the Greensburg-tp board of education for 10 years and was an assessor in that township for 10 years.
