Detroit Cuts Yanks' Lead to Two Games

The Brooklyn Dodgers today had almost forsaken the job of chasing the front-running St. Louis Cardinals to ward off the challenge of the Pittsburgh Pirates, for the Dodgers are closer to the third-place Pirates—four games—than they are to the

Cardinals, who lead by 4½.

The Dodgers beat the Pirates, 8-7. Friday, but only after a 10inning struggle. They got four runs in their half of the inning Billy Herman worked a perfect squeeze bunt off Bill Brandt, Pittsburgh pitcher, to send across the winning run.

Mort Cooper racked up his 11th triumph and his fourth shutout as the Cardinals blanked the Braves, 7-0. Cooper allowed only three hits.

The Cubs came through with two runs in the 12th to whip the Giants, 5-3. Ace Adams gave up the two winning tallies in his 36th relief appearance of the year. Bill Nicholson's triple scored Phil Cavaretta with the winning run. The Reds came from behind with six runs in the sixth to wipe out a 4-1 handicap and defeat the Phillies, 11-4, in a night game.

In the American League, Detroit bounced to within two games of the idle, leagueleading Yankees by blanking the A's, 4-0, in a twilight game. Hal White allowed the A's only four hits.

A perfect squeeze bunt by Gerry Priddy in the 13th inning gave the Senators a 1-0 triumph over Cleveland. Priddy's blow pushed across Bob Johnson who had walked and reached third on Alex Kampouris' single.

Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals was pace setter in the National League, boosting his last week's mark 39 points to post a .329 figure for 71 games.

The National League retained its lead in club hitting and fielding. The Cincinnati Reds stayed at the top of the fielding list with percentage of .979 and the Brooklyn Dodgers continued to top the majors in hitting, clouting the ball for a team average of .266.

The Philadelphia Athletics are in the sole possession of first place in American League fielding with an average of .976 as the Detroit Tigers pace the junior circuit in hitting with a team average mark
