

Marjorie Lawrence to Sing at Stadium Monday Night

Marjorie Lawrence, Metropolitan Opera Co. soprano, and the Madison Concert band will open the city's "Evening Star" concerts at 8 p. m. Monday in Camp Randall stadium, offering a program featuring popular music and light classics.

Miss Lawrence will include two operatic arias in her program—both of them favorites with the public. They are "Il est doux, il est bon," from Massenet's "Herodiade," and the "Seguidilla" from Bizet's "Carmen."

She will also sing the Bach-Gounod "Ave Maria," the Australians' "Waltzing Matilda," and other numbers. Sigfrid Prager will conduct the new, 45-piece band in music ranging from "Tea for Two" to the "Russian and Ludmilla" overture.

The concert, and others which will follow it this summer, will be presented by the Madison board of park commissioners in cooperation with the Madison Vocational school. Tickets will be available Monday at the city hall, at stadium gates 6 and 7 on Breese terrace, and at the vocational school.

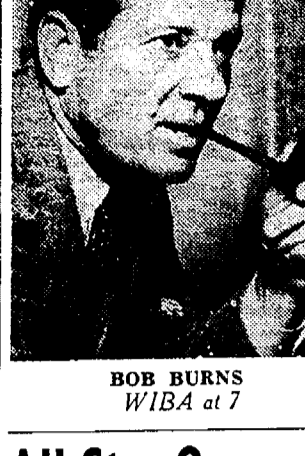
