Conductor Recalls Anecdote of Late George Gershwin

With many radio and concert musicians observing the sixth anniversary of George Gershwin's death today, scores of stories about the vital American composer are being recalled.

One anecdote comes from Howard Barlow, conductor who is to direct the New York Philharmonic-Symphony in a number of Sunday afternoon broadcasts on the Columbia network late this summer and next winter.

"Gershwin and I were to do a broadcast together," Barlow says, "of his 'Concerto in F.' When he learned that I was going to conduct without a score, he was very much upset. 'I'll be afraid that you'll forget something, and I won't be able to play well,' George

exclaimed. "The fact that I always memorize music, that I never use a score, failed to calm him; and, sure enough, at rehearsal, he did miss several cues-all because I didn't have any

music in front of me. "And so, at the actual performance, I put the score on the conductor's stand. Only I turned it upside down. Just to make George think I actually was using it I turned six or seven pages at a time every once in a while. Incidentally, George didn't make a single

slip but played brilliantly." Barlow is a great admirer of Gershwin and his music. "When Gershwin died," the conductor says, "American music suffered its greatest loss since the death of MacDowell. For me the 'Rhapsody in Blue' is the American 'Finlandia.'" the Library will receive two
