ROMMEL'S FLIGHT IN AFRICA IS PORTRAYED AT THE SIGMA

Drive In Brings Commando Yarn, While Quilna And Ohio Offer Stirring Musical Comedies

A behind-the-African scenes adventure, "Five Graves to Cairo," opens an engagement at the Sigma Saturday and will show thru Tuesday. Erich von Stroheim portrays German Field Marshal Rommel and others in this desert war melodrama include Anne Baxter, Franchot Tone and Akim Tamiroff. Also opening is "Yanks Ahoy."

Commencing an engagement at the Drive in theatre Sunday will be "Commandos Strike at Dawn," action-packed hit star Paul Muni and Lillian Gish. This production will show thru Tuesday.

Presented at the Quilna is "Coney Island," a technicolor musical picture which stars Betty Grable, George Montgomery, Cesar Romero and a host of other favorites in a real vacation of entertaining and invigorating variety. Many hit tunes composed by Leo Robin and Ralph Rainger are presented.

Judy Garland and Van Heflin play the romantic leads in the merry musical "Presenting Little Mavis," now playing at the Ohio. The film, based on Booth Tarkington's popular novel, tells the story of a young actress' rise to stardom. Others featured are Fay Bainter, Richard Carlson and Spring Byington.

Cine smoke fills the plains as ranchers and bandits fight to a standstill in "Wolves of the Range," which begins Saturday midnight at the Lyric. Also opening will be "United We Stand." Ending Saturday evening will be "The Man in the Trunk," and "Frontier Scout."

Saturday will be the final day for the showing of "Night Plane From Chungking," and "The Falcon Strikes Back" at the State. Robert Preston, Ellen Drew, Tom Conway and Harriett Hilliard have the principal roles.

Coming to the Majestic Sunday will be "Sin Town," and "When Johnny Comes Marching Home," "It Ain't Hay," an Abbott and Costello hit, and "Cat People," show thru Saturday.

NEW AND OLD TUNES HEARD AT QUILNA'S EXTRAVAGANZA

Hurry . . . hurry . . . hurry to the Quilna theatre, where one of the top musicals of all time is showing! We're talking about "Coney Island," and Technicolor extravaganza which stars Betty Grable, George Montgomery and Cesar Romero.

There is no rationing of entertainment in this superlative picture. Among the new tunes with which "Coney Island" is liberally sprinkled are "Take It From There," "Beautiful Coney Island," "Miss Lulu From Louisville" and "There's Danger in a Dance," all by Leo Robin and Ralph Rainger. The old favorites include "Put Your Arms Around Me Honey," "Who Threw the Overalls in Mistress Murphy's Chowder?" "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling," "Darktown Strutters Ball," "In My Harem" and "Cuddle Up a Little Closer."

Charles Wimninger and Phil Silvers top the featured cast of the film.



WASHINGON, July 17—(AP)—The job of recruiting 100,000 young women for nursing duties at home and abroad was started today by the Public Health Service and congress' number one nursing gen, Rep. Frances P. Bolton (D-Ohio).

It will be no easy task to fill the ranks of the United States Cadet Nurse Corps, Mrs. Bolton said, because of the competition of such other women's activities as the WACS, the WAVES, the SPARS and the Marines.

Training of nurses under the program will be handled in hospitals and nursing schools, and students must agree to remain available for the military or essential civilian nursing service for the duration.
