Braves Trip Up Brooklyn, 3-2

Boston Red Sox Hand Candini Second Loss

The Pittsburgh Pirates, dubbed the "accordion" club because of their classic collapses, have been painfully barren of success stories for several years.

Rip, whose dipper pitch has brought him 13 victories and ranking as the best hurler in the majors today, spends his spare time in directing catchers for the Pirates while perfecting the softest pitch in the game.

He was trapped off third, and in an attempted run-down drew Catcher Walker Cooper away from the plate, feinted him into throwing and then raced past the St. Louis' backstop to score.

The Pirates amassed 15 hits off four Cardinal pitchers, tallying five runs in the first and sewing up the game with a pair in the fourth.

Yanks Win Again Boston spoiled the Dodgers' chances of picking up a full game on the Cardinals by defeating Brooklyn, 3-2, behind the five-hit hurling of Nate Andrews.

Kirby Higbe, Brooklyn starter, was ejected by Umpire Bill Stewart in the second inning for throwing down his glove after a second ball was called on Chuck Workman.

In the American Legion, the leading New York Yankees edged out the Athletics, 6-5, as Frankie Crosetti's third hit, an eight-inning single, provided the winning edge.

Oscar Judd set back the Washington Senators with five hits as the Boston Red Sox handled Milo Candini his second setback of the season.

Friday's game against the Yankees? I'm glad you asked that question. You see, I had planned to rest Flores until something definite was decided about his elbow.

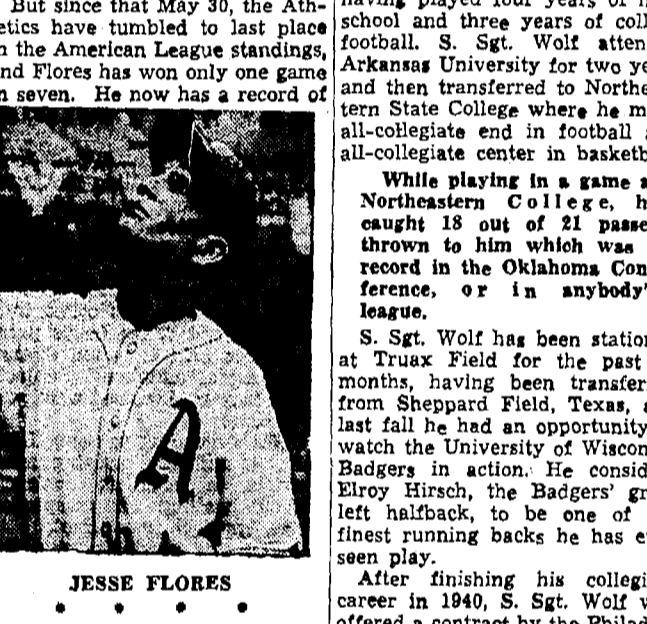

Jesse Flores Has Turned Out to Be a 'Morning Glory' Hurler

NEW YORK — (AP) — They're already calling Jesse Flores a "morning glory" pitcher—a flinger who blossoms briefly and then fades—and pride has prevented the Mexican moundsman from explaining his descent from rookie greatness to mediocrity.

Flora's, stocky, righthanded pitcher of the Philadelphia Athletics, was the "hottest" flinger in the majors on May 30, when he had registered seven victories against one lone defeat.
