BARBARA STANWYCK STARS IN SPECTACULAR SIGMA MOVIE

"Happy Go Lucky" Comes To Slate Sunday, A Gay Story Of Thrills On A Summer Vacation

Virginia Gardner and Dallas Worth are two of the many gorgeous showgirls who enhance the chorus-line in "Lady of Burlesque," spectacular showpiece starring Barbara Stanwyck which opens Saturday at the Sigma. Completing the program is "Natty Nuisance."

All the thrills and fun of a summer vacation, plus a lot more, are said to abound in the new musical comedy, "Happy Go Lucky," which comes to the State on Sunday. "Fall In," also will open. Ending Saturday will be "I Walked With a Zombie," and "Gildersleeve's Bad Day."

Saturday will be the final day for the showing of "Something To Shout About" with Don Ameche, Jack Oakie and Janet Blair.

"World Problems Of Labor" To Be Discussion Subject On Post-War Planning Series, "For This We Fight"

Boris Karloff, the big boogie man of the fillums, will be Groucho Marx' hair-raising guest in "Blue Ribbon Town," Saturday, at 10:15 p. m., EWT, over Station WABC. Visiting Groucho at 33 Blue Ribbon Lane, he'll ask permission to bring along some of his friends (or is that word spelled friends?) and thereupon leads in the most gruesome accumulation of zombies ever to hit the kilocycles.

Few problems have acquired so international a character in recent years as those of organized labor. Leaders of industry and labor realize that an unbridled worker on a distant continent may affect competition and living standards all over the world. Thus "World Problems of Labor" will be the discussion subject on the post-war planning series, "For This We Fight," on Saturday (WEAP, 7 p. m., EWT). Carey, secretary of the Congress of Industrial Organizations, and Carter Goodrich, chairman of the governing body of the International Labor Office.

A special program in honor of the Colombian Independence Day will be presented by the Office of the Coordinator of Inter-American Affairs, on Saturday, at 11:30 p. m., EWT, over WJZ. Bob Chester, the sizzling tenor saxophonist and composer whose song, "Octave Jump" is so hot that only his own band can tackle the lyrics, will blow some of his sweet licks when he appears as guest bandleader on Barry Wood's popular "Million Dollar Band" program, Saturday (WEAP, 10 p. m., EWT).

62 PERSONS IN LIMA RECEIVE HELP IN JUNE

Lima had 47 relief cases involving 62 persons, it was revealed in a report for the month of June by local relief heads. The total expenditures for the month amounted to \$787.57, an average of \$14.03 per case and \$12.46 a person. Expenditures were listed as: Direct relief \$485.75; administration \$258.32; pre-audit charge \$41.18 and an adjustment \$1.32, totaling \$787.57. In Chicago last year, 8,106 families shared the products of 547 community war gardens.
